A reading from Psalm 148

Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise him in the heights above. Praise him, all his angels; praise him, all his heavenly hosts. Praise him, sun and moon; praise him, all you shining stars. There were other [men and women of faith] who faced jeers and flogging, even chains and imprisonment. They wandered in deserts and mountains, living in caves and in holes in the ground. These were all commended for their faith, yet none of them received what had been promised, since God had planned something better for us so that only together with us would they be made perfect. Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. Food for thought in the silence

“Hebrews is keenly aware that the readers are in danger of being weary with all that they are facing, day after day: threats, persecution, intimidation and mockery from their contemporaries, their neighbours and perhaps their former friends. [...] They must keep going; they must remind themselves continually of the one who blazed this trail in the first place; they must think how much worse it was for him. That way they will keep from becoming worn out completely. As so often in the Christian life, reminding yourself of *truth*, not trying to conjure up *feelings* of this or that sort, is the way to keep going in faith and patience.”
