

From The Rector Back to Church Sunday...

"But many other days are just right..."

September 30th – a day when many churches across the country have invited everyone who has been part of their life, in ways large and small to visit again. Hawkesley and Immanuel have invited school and community to join them for their Harvest Festivals on the day.

But St Nicolas hasn't, because 30th September is the Sunday before the first Monday in October – Mop Day. From early morning The Green is full of big Lorries, ride builders and empty food stalls. Getting into church is only for the fit and determined. It's not the best day for saying, "Come and visit again."

But many other days are just right.

November 4th is All Saints Sunday – a day to celebrate, give thanks and remember – and maybe return. For some it will be hard. At 4pm we hold our annual Memorial Service for the families and friends of all whose funerals we have shared in over the past year. St Nicolas will be full of sharp memory of being here in grief. Please keep the service and all who will be there in your prayers. But the morning will be different – as we give thanks for the whole company of saints, including those who have shaped our own lives and the life of God's church and people here in Kings Norton. There are so many to give thanks for – and so much promise to trust for the future. Do join us.

And then there is St Nicolas Day itself - **December 6**th. It's a Thursday this year – but the weekend after will be very special. The Old Grammar School will at last be open on the Saturday! It will also be Farmers' Market – and St Nicolas will be open for all to visit, pray and discover more of all that we are doing and planning.

Sunday, 9th December will be St Nicolas Festival day with our annual Gift Service at 10.30am and special celebrations at every service.

It may seem a long way off – but not too early to prepare and pray – and, if you haven't been for a while, to think about joining us.

The wonder and the challenge of St Nicolas is that thousands have their special place and special story in its life - but in so many different ways. For some it is the place which has shaped faith throughout their lives. others, it is a place of new discovery and welcome - of return to God and church after often painful searching. For some, it is a place of weekly or even daily commitment. others it is the place of special times weddings, baptisms, funerals, school visits, concerts or Christmas. Some are lifted when they come in; some find it hard. Many love the building from the outside but are anxious about pushing open the door, unsure of the welcome which might await. Some like lively services. Others treasure the quiet.

At the heart of all that we love, worry about, seek and find in our parish church building is however the heart of the Gospel itself: Jesus' two great commandments to love God and to love neighbour – and the promise that through his own death and rising, made alive in us through the Holy Spirit, we shall find grace and strength to keep them for the sake of all. Our place in St Nicolas is secure as long as we care first for the place of others – which will be very different. It is a hard but wonderful challenge. Why not come to church – and share in accepting it? It is yours.

FOCUS ON... Church Mission Society

Knowing that Grace, our mission partner works for the Church Missionary Society, the article on the back page of its Prayerlines booklet about its early days may be of interest.

In 1799 the founders of CMS had few precedents to help them shape the work of the new Society for although the Established Church had formed SPCK and SPG, (Societies for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge & the Gospel respectively), both were limited to the pastoral care & education of the English abroad, rather than for cross-cultural evangelistic mission.

The first meeting of the Society adopted the four following principles suggested by the Vicar of Clapham at the time, John Venn:

- Follow God's leading & look to success only from work of the Holy Spirit.
- Send out people of the highest calibre.
- Be prepared to begin on a small scale.
- · Finance will follow effective work.

In their widest dreams, those early founders could not have foreseen where their enterprise would lead, as, for example exemplified by Grace herself & the work she has undertaken!



Georgian West Gallery Music returns to Moseley Church

The parish church of St. Mary's Moseley will once again ring with the sounds of its musical history on Saturday 3rd of November. A 'West Gallery' workshop called "Sing Birmingham" is taking place there from 10 a.m. hosted by the Royal School of Church Music. Members of the West Gallery Music Association will be leading a day teaching West Gallery songs from Georgian times.

The West Gallery tradition involved groups of local singers and musicians who used to lead the singing in church services. They were generally positioned in a gallery at the west end of the church, which is why it became known as "West Gallery" music. This style of music was often written or adapted by local composers, and often contains fugue passages, sections in the music where one line of words is repeated by different voices. This creates a rich and

exciting sound. The West Gallery music was overtaken by the desire for a more structured approach to music, lead by an organ and a formal choir.



mother. wishing her son's encourage progress at the piano. bought tickets to performance by the great Polish pianist Ignace Paderewski. When evening arrived, they found their seats near the front of the concert hall and eved majestic Steinway waiting on the stage. Soon the mother found a friend to talk to, and the boy slipped away.

At eight o'clock, the lights in the auditorium began to dim, the spotlights came on, and only then did they notice the boy - up on the piano bench, innocently picking out "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star." His mother gasped in shock and embarrassment but, before she could retrieve

her son, the master himself appeared on the stage and quickly moved to the keyboard.

He whispered gently to the boy, "Don't quit. Keep playing." Leaning over, Paderewski reached down with his left hand and began

filling in the bass part. Soon right arm reached around the other side and improvised delightful a obligato. Together, the old master and the young the crowd novice held with their mesmerized and beautiful blended music.

In all our lives, we receive helping hands - some we notice. some we don't. Equally we ourselves have countless opportunities to provide helping hands sometimes we would like assistance to be our noticed. sometimes don't. Little of what we all achieve is without learning from others and without support from others and what we receive we should hand out.

IGNACE JAN PADEREWSKI (1860 - 1941)

Ignace Jan Paderewski was born in 1860 in the village of Kurylowka, Podolia, Poland. He studied at the Warsaw Musical Institute and with many Eastern European teachers. He became one of Poland's world renowned pianists and composers. Although his own compositions are well known, Paderewski was widely praised for his renditions of Chopin. In addition to delighting Poland and the world with his music for over 50 years, Paderewski also became one of Poland's great statesmen. At the beginning of World War I, Paderewski founded a committee to

assist the people of Poland and established branches in Paris, London and throughout the United States. Paderewski's efforts, with support from the American government and American people, helped Poland regain her freedom after World War I. He was also one of the signers of the Paris Peace Treaty which was responsible for re-establishing the proper boundaries between Poland and her neighbours. Paderewski became the chief framer of the Polish Constitution of 1919 and served as Poland's delegate to the League of Nations in Geneva. Upon Poland's Independence, in 1918, Paderewski became its Prime Minister and Secretary of Foreign Affairs. Died: 29 June 1941 New York.

15th October is National Baby Loss Awareness day in the UK.

It was originally inspired by Pregnancy & Infant Loss Remembrance day in the US and

by 2004 in the UK The Baby Loss Awareness campaign group was formed, a collaboration between the following five organisations: The Miscarriage Association, Sands (the stillbirth & neonatal death charity), ARC (Antenatal results and choices), Babyloss and The Ectopic Pregnancy Trust.

Each group offering support and information in their own area of expertise to anyone personally affected by pregnancy or baby loss.

Who are these people that they help? Well, chances are that every single one of us know someone who could be helped by one of these organisations in some way. However, it often seems to be a subject that people find difficult to handle when talking to people affected by pregnancy/baby loss. "It wasn't meant to be" " You're young, you'll have another one" "Concentrate on your work" "Get yourself a cat!" Believe it or not these were all said to me and my husband by people who meant well. Worse still they say nothing in fear that you're going to get upset.

From experience: just spend time listening to them and have plenty of tissues ready.

To mark the Baby Loss Awareness day on the 15th October I invite you all to take part in the global 'Wave of Light' in your own homes. Simply light a candle at 7PM and leave it burning for at least 1 hour to join others in remembering all babies that have died during pregnancy, at, during and after birth. The babies who lit up our lives for only a short time.



Rebecca's Diary...

Rev Rebecca Pullin recalls the month of AUGUST

This month has been marked by many people going away on holiday, grabbing the opportunity for some far away sun before the autumn kicks in and the children go back to school. However, I'm not due to go away until October so I've been around for the whole of August. So here are some more extracts from my diary:

3rd Aug:

I went to the shops and brought some more photo frames. I seem to have acquired lots of photos lately and so I wanted to get them on my walls. Well, you know how it is when you have a load of carrier bags and you think you can carry them all, usually about twenty! For some bizarre reason we think it will save us time1 Yes, you have guessed it. I grabbed all my shopping and weighed down, set off towards my house. unfortunately. I slipped, bags flung forward, handbag went flying. Two young teenage lads came along asked me if I was ok, found my handbag and gave it back to me and helped me pick up my shopping. A Letter from the Kings Norton Parish Treasurer

"one of my jobs is to try and raise the profile of Gift Aid (nothing to do with Christian Aid)..."

Firstly, a very large "thank you" to everyone who shares in supporting the work of the Church in this parish. I say "share" because it is the calling of all baptised members of the Church to work together to pass on the good new of Christ's death and resurrection. God calls each and every one of us to be part of his mission and ministry here on earth. We do this in a variety of ways and each way is unique and appreciated and often unquantifiable by any means that the world understands. So, thank you.

Secondly, Treasurer, one of my jobs is to try and raise the profile Gift (nothing to do with Christian Aid). Gift Aid is a government scheme for increasing the value of a donation registered and charity available all to those who pay basic rate income tax or capital gains

tax. Last year this parish benefited from this scheme by £17,143, a not insignificant amount of money. So, "thank you" to all those who donated money to this parish using this scheme.

Thirdly, to those of you who donate money to this parish, pay income tax at the basic rate or higher (or who are liable for capital gains tax during this financial year), but do not use this scheme, could I please ask you to consider using it? In very simple terms Gift Aid works like this:

For every £1 you donate to a registered charity, the charity can claim from the Inland Revenue £0.28. This comes from the tax that you have already paid to the IR. So your £1 becomes £1.28.

Obviously the IR cannot pay back more than the tax you have paid in any one tax year, so donating via Gift Aid does have a limit!

All in all, it makes good business sense for any registered charity to maximise its income by reclaiming as much tax on donations as possible. I realise that not all of the people who donate money to St Nicolas, Immanuel, Hawkesley or Restoration pay basic rate or higher income tax, but for those who do, please, please consider doing it by Gift Aid. All it takes is for you to complete a very simple declaration form (available from me or the Parish Office) and to let us know how you will make your donation (cheque, cash or Standing Order). It doesn't have to be a regular donation or even the same amount each time, but it does help us to budget our expenses if you are able to do this. Thank you.

BOOKS REVIEW by Revd David Gould

William Wilberforce: The Life of the Great Anti-Slave Trade Campaigner Author: William Hague Published by Harper Collins

I sense the need to rise to the challenge of upping my reading and the obvious way for me to do that is to commit myself to review at least two books a month. The secondary

benefit is that it offers the chance to read and hence comment more widely, addressing the concerns of those who think that books are rather expensive like the first this month, or marginal, like the second. Perhaps I could also address those two concerns head on as I review!

Most of us have heard of William Hague, a few will know he is from Yorkshire. Some will know of his prolific speaking and writing. Here is the chance to read his take on Wilberforce, a biography that is 582 pages long so not for the feint hearted. What I found as I read this amazing book is how one was transported back into the world of William Wilberforce. One was not simply digesting facts about speeches or elections and so on. Instead I found myself drawn into the life of electioneering at that time, the transport around the UK, the fascinating diversions into social codes and at the centre of it all a man who sought to change the very manners of England as well as see an end to the trade in slaves. In so doing we are taken into this mans life, his origins and education. We glimpse the early exposure to radical faith that was about a changed life and style of life. We are taken, painfully at times, through the extraordinary demands of a man who seeks to conform his life to his faith and his understanding of the calling of

The fact that it takes his lifetime to achieve even part of his ambition, that his family turn out to be less than he had hoped and that he ends his days in much reduced circumstances is testimony to an honest and compelling account of a rich and well lived life, with few happy endings. I was left with much to think on, aware that through William Hague's telling of the story of William Wilberforce I had been treated to an elegant and disturbing volume that challenged my politics, my faith and my sense of how to meld that all together in this thing called life.

If in doubt, try it and be fascinated!

Greenbelt this year so I went along to hear him. I was completely taken aback at how powerful is his work and how the speaking out of it by the author brought it so vividly to life for me. It seemed to touch something very deep inside, perhaps that part of me that loves such literature but is rarely fed. In this small volume Michael O'Siadhail describes the way that love informs and shapes our lives if it once takes hold of us through another, be that the domestic hum-drum or the wilder intoxication. The writing is sharp and arresting, the lines speaking of their subjects with an intensity that is so often lacking in writings about love that are more readily available.

I dare you to try this volume and allow yourself to be touched by it!

Halloween, All Saints' and All Souls'

Halloween is a shortened form of All

Hallows Eve. and Hallows comes from an Old English word, "Halig", which means "holy"; so All Hallows Day is All Saints' Day, and Halloween is the evening before [Nov 1st and Oct 31st in our modern calendarl. It originates from an ancient Celtic Festival (pre-Christian) - to the Lord of the Dead - Samhain [Gaelic name - Oiche Shamhna or Samhuinn or, in Wales, Nos Calan Gaeafl, This is a festival about light and dark, gathered in harvest, and about dead and living. Nov 1st, or the nearest New Moon, marked the beginning of the New Year (as well as winter) for the ancient Celts, and bonfires were lit and divination games were played. Our ancestors believed that, at this time of year, the thin veil between the living and the dead were merged. and access to departed friends and family was gained. Unfortunately this also meant that unwelcome evil or vengeful spirits

so grotesque masks were worn and bonfires lit to frighten away the bad spirits. This is where the tradition of masks and costumes of skeletons and witches originates from – as does lanterns made from pumpkins or turnips. Just as the Celtic day began at sunset, their year began at the beginning of winter. Their other main celebration was May 1st – Beltane – the beginning of summer with Dawn light celebrations.

The Romans adopted this Celtic festival by introducing a harvest festival of their own on Nov 1st. Pomona was the Roman goddess of fruit and trees, and she was symbolised by an apple – the origin of the custom of apple bobbing.

The arrival of Christianity in Europe changed the whole nature of the festival. November 1st became a day for commemoration of saints and was known as All Saints' Day, or All Hallows. Some Christian traditions believe the

Faithful go to a sort of "waiting place" first – and All Souls Day [Nov 2nd] is a special day to pray for the souls in this waiting place, before they arrive in Heaven. During the middle-ages, enterprising poor people would take the opportunity of All Souls' Day to offer to pray for the living and the dead, in exchange for "soul cakes". These cakes were buns – similar to hot-cross buns, but with the cross replaced by white icing, which was said to represent the robes of the saints. This was the origin of trick-or-treating, as no-one in that religious period of history would want to risk refusing the offer of prayers for their soul.

Some Christians are uncomfortable with celebrating Halloween – as they see only the evil spirits and not all the other facets to the festival. Some people tried to change Oct 31st into a day to celebrate Martin Luther's work of reformation of the church (challenging the authorities to ensure that the church followed the gospel

teachings of Jesus, rather than help the leaders get rich and powerful) – for it was on Oct 31st 1517 that Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to a door in Wittenberg, Germany [the medieval equivalent of posting something on a public or web notice-board].

A Christian does not fear the spirits of the faithful dead – for they are already in Heaven-so the lanterns and bonfires and masks are not needed for frightening away the spirits of the dead, but more for having a good time – and celebrating the light that will come again when spring returns, and celebrating the lives of all the Saints (the ones formally called "Saint..." and all those whose lives have been faithful to God). In the Christian life, there are not separate deities (gods and goddesses) for different parts of our life – but the apple bobbing and other games can be used as enjoyable ways to give thanks for creation and the blessings of harvest.

Rather than trying to ignore or stop Halloween celebrations – why not adopt them fully, and enter into them in the light of a Christian belief.

Our pastoral care team has extended its role to being available to pray with people either on Sundays or during the week. Our church has been "driven" to


prayer over recent months and has seen some great answers, but is still aware that all of us need prayerful support at different times in our lives.
