BIBLEFRESH

As mentioned in Sylvia's article about the Bible Society, 2011 marks 400 years of the publication of the Kings James' Version, ie. the Bible written in English. To celebrate this, comes Biblefresh. This is a movement of many, many churches, agencies, organisations, colleges and festivals which has a vision to reignite and re-enthuse the church in its passion for the Bible. The aim of the Biblefresh initiative is to encourage a greater confidence and passion for Scripture across the Church. Churches are invited to join the movement by agreeing to increase their church's level of biblical engagement in four ways: reading, training, translation and experience. Centrally, Biblefresh will encourage the partner organisations to respond to the need by providing access to relevant reading, audio, video, and training resources. By asking churches to re-focus on the Bible for the year, Biblefresh hopes that "the fruit in the UK Church would be an increased hunger and desire for the Word of God which would result in more lives saved and transformed." As an example, Scripture Union, the Bible Society and Wycliffe Bible Translators have launched the E100 Bible Reading Challenge. This is based around 100 carefully selected Bible readings (50 from the Old Testament and 50 from the New Testament) designed to give participants a good understanding of the overall Bible story from Genesis to Revelation. The 'E' stands for Essential and each of the Essential 100 readings ranges from a few verses to a few chapters. The programme can be found at www.e100challenge.org.uk. If you don't have access to the internet, I am happy to provide you with a copy if you would like one. I have already given one out to each of the Immanuel congregation on Bible Sunday!

Alternatively, CWR have launched a challenge to read the Bible in a year, using their "Cover to Cover Complete" resource, which "really brings that reading alive — and turns it into a gripping journey of discovery! It has everything you need to watch the unfolding of God's purposes over the centuries including charts, maps, illustrations, diagrams, timelines and devotional thoughts. It also contains the complete Bible text in chronological order — the events as they happened." More information can be found at www.cwr.org.uk

From The Rector

Sorrow, service and joy together

n Remembrance Sunday, we did something new. Led by our choir, Scouts, Guides, Brownies, Cubs, Rainbows, Beavers and others, we all went out with solemn informality at the end of our Remembrance Service and laid poppies at the 18 war graves in our churchyard. These have all been researched and cleaned by the Year II pupils at Kings Norton Boys' School who also shared our Remembrance ceremony on 11th November at the Lych Gate.

Like many, I was deeply moved by the care of our young people for those who have died in war and by their serious thanksgiving for the freedom and peace which those sacrifices have given us. I was also deeply moved that our churchyard was filled with people of all ages, informally sharing together in a common task of love.

We all have our own deep memories. They are within us all the time - but on Remembrance Sunday they were held by us all, together in God's grace. We remembered together. As Jesus said, "Bear one another's burdens" so that together we find his healing and peace. Led by young people of Kings Norton, that is what church is meant to be.

The community which grieved together at Remembrance is called to be the same community which will commit itself on St Nicolas Festival Day (5th December)

to service of others in Christ - and which gathers to celebrate in joy the gift of Jesus at Christmas. That too is what church is meant to be, in this life and in life to come.

Just as at Remembrance, we each bring deep memories to what it means to serve others in Christ and to our keeping of Christmas. My prayer this Christmas is that, in all our differences, we shall each be renewed in being part of that one community of Christ which grieves, serves and celebrates together. God's Word made flesh in Jesus alone makes that possible – and the world so needs it. Please join us!

Mission Focus - Bible Society

We support the **Bible Society** through personal action and donation and also via the annual Women's World Day of Prayer Service.

Most of us own at *least* one Bible and many households have several - in different translations and publications. It is hard to get your head around the fact that some people still do not have access to it in their own tongue. Think what it must be like to hear it for the first time in a language you REALLY understand!

Linguists work with indigenous believers to create accurate and meaningful translations. Usually the Gospels are completed first. Two such languages where work is going on today, are Pokomchi, a language from the Columbian Andes and Konabere, the language spoken by the Konakuma people. This latter group live in Tansilla, on the borders of Burkina Faso and Mali - so when they go to church the preaching is in Bambare and Madere, and the hymns are sung in Boma - but nothing is in their own mother tongue of Komabere. There are 60.000 Konabere speakers...that is twice the number of people living in this parish - and they need the Bible in a form that makes God seem real and relevant. Another translation being created - rather nearer to home - is the aural bible in Patois. It was first heard in the UK at Pentecost this year - and is said to be reaching out to those who are too old or poor to travel back to Jamaica, or those younger Jamaicans who find the English Bible a "foreigner's book".

Often the Bible translating work goes alongside literacy teaching programmes so that the people are doubly enabled in their lives.

It is so easy to think of the Bible as "having always been there". Pause for a moment to give thanks for those who translated it into English 400 years ago.

St Nicolas Festival – Sunday 5th December A Special Parish Celebration at 10.30am

St Nicolas's Day is 6th December. This year it is a Monday, so we keep his feast the day before with a joint service in St Nicolas for all.

(We've been invited by St Nicholas, Alcester to join their 6th December celebrations with worship, feasting and fireworks. Interested?)

In Kings Norton, it matters that we see "St Nicolas" as more than a name for our largest church. He is patron saint and example for every part of our parish life. We do not know when or why our forebears began dedicating church and parish in St Nicolas' name (or why they chose to use the French version with no 'h'). We need simply to be grateful that they chose a saint whose life speaks so strongly today.

"Church" seems so often to look inwards to its own needs. These matter - but, like St Nicolas, our first calling is to look outwards - to the needs of children, women, sailors, bankers (!) and those in all kinds of need. He was not a stay-at-home, but a traveller for prayer and peace in his native land, now Turkey, and the Holy Land. (Even after death, his bones were moved from Myra to Bari in Southern Italy.) His story is still deeply told in different ways in so many different countries. (See the link to "St Nicolas the Saint" on our website www.kingsnorton.org.uk)

Many church members and friends are already deeply involved in so many outward-looking activities and causes. Here are <u>some</u>:

- o Christian Aid, fair trade, development and disaster relief
- o Baptism, marriage and bereavement ministries
- o Local schools, the Children's Society, young people at risk
- O Other countries e.g. Malawi, Afghanistan, Nepal, Romania
- o Human trafficking, refugees and homelessness
- o Local regeneration, local needs, families under pressure
- o Hospitality ministry in each congregation

There are others – and they all grow out of the St Nicolas Day Gospel – Mark 10.13-16. We need to embrace them together – and grow.

Kings Norton 3 Estates – New Futures, new work

Kings Norton 3 Estates New Deal for Communities programme ended in March 2010. The main legacy is the **New Futures** regeneration programme. Key elements are:

- ♦ Demolition of 876 properties and building of 1392 new properties across the Three Estates
- ♦ Creation of a medium sized supermarket and local centre, fronting on Redditch Rd, with surrounding smaller retail units and housing
- Demolition of The Fold shops in Pool Farm and the creation of a new retail facility on Shannon Road
- ♦ Creation of new employment opportunities in retail and construction
- Provision of a new Youth Facility
- ♦ Environmental improvements new Village Green in Primrose
- ♦ Educational Improvements



Local services/ agencies can also book space at 10 -12 The Fold to deliver sessions and outreach. I'm looking forward to working with you."

TROOP AID - 4TH DECEMBER, 10AM-12 NOON

TROOP AID was founded in November 2006 by three exservicemen as a result of a visit to Selly Oak Hospital's Alexandra Wing in Birmingham. This is the home of the Defence Medical Welfare Services who are responsible for the welfare of all Armed Forces Personnel, male and female, who have been injured during the conflict in Afghanistan and elsewhere.

When Troops return to the United Kingdom from the war zones they arrive back without their personal effects or clothing. The objective of TROOP AID is to supply the 'basic essentials' when service casualties return from serving their country overseas. Examples of what we supply are a GRAB BAG containing washing and shaving kit, towel, face flannel, shower mules, socks, underwear, t-shirt and shorts. Female requirements are also provided. Our GRAB BAGS are currently being sent out to the UK Military Hospitals in Afghanistan, the new Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham and other Ministry of Defence Hospital Units within the UK.

This is the list of things we are being asked to bring to our packing morning in St Nicolas Church on Saturday 4th December 10.00 am – 12 noon:





Mission Focus—The Children's Society

he Children's Society was founded in 1881 by Sunday School teacher, Edward Rudolf who was appalled by the growing numbers of children living in terrible poverty; he had a vision of a world where every child had a good childhood. Today, The Children's Society still holds that vision.

Every year in Great Britain, over 100,000 children run away from home because of abuse, bullying and violence (often the consequences of alcohol abuse or drug taking) from their parents.

In Birmingham and Coventry, The Children's Society's SAFE IN THE CITY projects help hundreds of young runaways to stay safe and get back on track and also to avoid entering the care system. The STARS PROJECT works to help children whose parents abuse drugs or alcohol. These children experience emotional, behavioural and educational difficulties as well as often witnessing or being subject to violence.

The Children's Society works with children and young people in a way that is adjusted to their needs. If a child is running away from home or is in trouble with the law, the Society's workers try to find out all they can and talk through the problems to see the whole picture. The Society intervenes to get the children back on track, mediating between the family and the young person, if this kind of specialised support is needed.

The Children's Society runs many projects and more and more demands are being placed on them because family break up and dysfunction are ever more prominent in these financial times when jobs, and consequently homes, are being lost.

Kings Norton Parish has always been a stalwart supporter of The Children's Society – never before has the generosity of those who donate had a greater need. Your support, as always, is much appreciated.

INTER-GENERATIONAL PROJECT

We are hoping that this inter-generational link enriches the lives of the children at Fairway School, as well as the members of Kings Norton Seniors' Club. So far, it has proved to be inspirational!




