

Hawkesley Church Primary School

e have now received the final reports from our OFSTED Inspection on 9th/10th February and the required Church School Inspection in March. Both were very thorough. They found strengths in the school in the care that children receive and in the commitment of many children, parents, staff and governors. They also tell us that we have much to do as we work together to improve our school in the months and years ahead.

The Church School Inspection commended the quality of RE and Collective Worship, the strong relationship of school, clergy and church and the clear way that, in Hawkesley School, "Every Child Matters to God".

The OFSTED report, however, says that our school needs special measures. These will build on the improvements already made and also bring new resources and initiatives to ensure that Hawkesley is a good school. School staff, governors and children are already working hard at the key tasks identified in the report, especially in raising standards and ensuring good quality teaching and progression throughout the school.

The key issue is that we have not yet been able to appoint a permanent Head Teacher to replace Mr Dobson, who left in April 2009. Mrs Garratt and Mrs James have worked very hard as interim Head Teachers and given us new focus and direction. But, as the report says, we need a permanent Head Teacher here. We continue to do everything we can to make this happen.

We have already prepared a new School Development Plan. We are benefitting from the local authority's Improving Schools Programme. We have already made good progress on many inspection concerns.

We are confident that by working together, as Hawkesley has so often done in the past, the necessary change will happen. We are committed – and hope that you are too.

Thank you to all who work and learn at Hawkesley and to governor and volunteer colleagues from church who serve faithfully and quietly in so many fruitful ways. Hawkesley is a true partnership of Anglicans and Methodists, of children and adults and of community and church. In Christ and with your prayers, it will flourish.



BREAD

ne of the weeks in *Lentwise* we were bidden to think about the sustenance that Jesus brings. The Bible passages we were asked to look at were, on the face of it, very familiar ones - Exodus 16 (Manna from Heaven), John 6: 1-14 (the Feeding of the Five



Thousand) and John 6: 25-35 ("I am the Bread of Life"). Reading them together like this put them into much greater context. I was then made to ponder further on "bread" during the Eucharist in Holy Week (on Tuesday) when the Gospel Reading was the second of the John passages.

I realised afresh that this bread wasn't the stuff we might have as a side dish (think "garlic bread"), but absolute staple food of less affluent societies, who rely completely on the grain harvest to provide staple food... bread...be it made of maize or wheat or rye or whatever grain is grown locally. I enjoy making bread, but it is a pleasurable cooking activity, not the daily grind of making that day's food without which there is nothing else to eat. My bread is good to eat (well, I think it is anyway!) but there are plenty of alternatives if I run out of time or don't feel like it or some other similar excuse.

I thought again about the way we use food in the West when I created a visual for the Holy Week services. Which of our African or Indian neighbours would use two loaves of bread as a visual aid? As an offering maybe yes, but not just in a visual that wasn't going to be eaten or wasn't in a fit state to be eaten after several days in church.

I re-thought some values and understood those passages in a different light.

Parish Report for Annual Parochial Meeting

2009 was another year of changes, some long prayed, hoped and planned – and some unexpected. They bring us to what in many ways is a new beginning for Team, Church and parish. But, as ever, we are God's pilgrim people – and can trust God's grace and purpose in all that lies ahead.

We now have a full ministry team – working collegially across the parish, rather than dividing the parish's work among us. We are now growing together in Enriching Ministry and Mission within the diocesan Transforming Church programme and our own Mission Statement.

The long work of Restoration is now complete (40 years – not only the last intense six!). Kings Norton Restoration Trust is at last a separate body. We are now growing the ways in which KNRT and Church can work together for all in our communities.

Long-standing financial issues have been resolved. The climate in which we had to do this has meant that our assets and reserves are reduced – but they are also free for us to make wise and prayerful decision about their growth and best use.

Quinquennial Inspection of St Nicolas and its steady growth as the parish's church building enables us to look afresh at how we care for it.

Some pilgrims have moved on. To our human sense, the passing of Ted Bonner, Leonard Miskin, Gwen Fox, Olive Massey and many others feels wholly like loss. In Christ, it is not loss, it is fulfilment of their life, faith and gifts.

It is the same with those moving to new things on earth: Pat Linton, Olive Hill, Deb Buckley, Sian Smith, Jess and Graham Boulton, Karen Urwin - and Graeme Clarke and Emma Banks from KNRT. All take our deep thanks and prayers. We are now discovering the new gifts and directions which God has for us so that we can build on all their work and love among us here.

Where next?

We must ensure that in every change in society, we continue as the very rooted, inclusive parish church of Kings Norton – in our life and mission across the parish and in St Nicolas, the parish's church building, and through Hawkesley Church/School.

There are threats to be faced, new and old.

There is growing division in the Church of England and the world-wide Anglican Communion – but not here! In response, we are utterly committed to truly collegial and inclusive ministry and mission. We have differences, but the heart of Christ's Church is not that one side "wins" any argument. It is how we grow in our differences in mutual respect and encouragement. That is love! I am delighted at the new growth in common feeling for our common worship, mission and ministry and that we talk much less about "United Services" than about "Parish Services". St Nicolas Day, Holy Week and Confirmation are not the only examples.

There is a wide feeling that "traditional" church is in decline and that only new ways of being church will survive. Local experience tells otherwise. We need to hold our nerve in Christ as parish church for an area of great richness and great deprivation and grow in openness to all the unlikely ways in which God turns believing into belonging. Thousands here seek and trust God. Far fewer seek to belong to God's church. We need faithful imagination so that we recover our older parish history and let God re-shape it for present and future, in church and outside. And we need richer confidence of God's graceful purpose for us now and in the future.

Financial pressures increase and a parish church open to all has to renew vision and appeal in its funding. We can. We need to be honest about need for more "friends" to become supporters.

We must make wise decisions about our newly-freed assets to grow new mission and ministry and also ensure that St Nicolas Church, Hawkesley and Saint Nicolas Place are sustainable for at least the next 25 years.

Spiritual truth and earthly realities are not to be separated if the Word made flesh and dwelling among us is to be served and God's Kingdom enlarged. In God's grace, they go together.



Altogether we found doing the course a very moving experience as we explored the various themes through movement, creativity and



intensely personal exchanges. The weekly topics were direction, nourishment, light, water and shelter and using materials and resources from Christian Aid and Water Aid, from the wider created world (eg. the lightless winters in Scandinavia) and 'festivals of light', we tried to think of

what life would be like without these things. We followed this by looking at ways in which Christ brings water to the thirsty; how light comes to the darkness and direction to the lost.

We used creative writing, personal accounts, life stories, displays, presentations, books, pictures, candles, different types of lighting, symbols, visual aids, imagery and imagination. We also used several movements around the church and even a couple of trips outside to the Lych Gate. It was designed to appeal to all the senses and also to enable us as a group to experience different frameworks, different seating arrangements, different outcomes and ways of doing things. This was intended to acclimatise us to the nature of 'journeys' and, in particular, the strange disorientation of the Lenten journey and the

change that this brings. Our aim was to try and bring everyone in the group to a better understanding of their own journey and the intimate closeness of God within it.

One very moving and inspirational aspect of our Lenten journey was to record, week upon week, our experiences in sand trays. We did this both pictorially, with words and by



sculpting with pebbles, feathers, glass beads, photographs and candles. Each week these were photographed by Graham, before being wiping out, helping to emphasise the transitory nature of a Lenten journey and even of the Christian life. The results of this are to be found in our Easter Garden.

If I have a regret about the course, it is that it did not contain a component about forgiveness. Forgiveness is such a huge part of our religious conviction and of Jesus' story and journey. I could not have continued on mine without it.

For me personally, these weeks were a particularly poignant journey because it is Graham's and my last Lent, Holy Week and Easter here in Kings Norton. The solidarity and intimacy that the course developed is something I will cherish and remember in the years to come.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 9–15 May 2010

Rosalind McLaughlin, a Christian Aid Week representative, travelled to Kenya with a group of other organisers and collectors. She saw the work of Christian Aid partner MNU in Kiambiu slum, and discovered what life is like in Matopeni, where it has yet to start work. This is her story...



'The first things we saw when we arrived in Matopeni were the results of the "flying toilets". There's not a single toilet here, so people go, put it in a bag, and throw it over the wall. And there is no official tap or clean running water. People have managed to reach the water pipes below the ground – but the water is really filthy and carries typhoid.



'A lady called Catherine Kithuku (pictured below) showed us around. It was incredible. We were led along a walkway that runs alongside the houses. It was constructed of planks that were half-broken, and directly underneath it ran the community's drainage system. Catherine said when it rains her family home floods with sewage right up to the level of the beds, soaking the mattresses.

'The dignity of the people here and the sense of community are very striking. It's about we, not me. Catherine has already formed a group that has organised rubbish collections and educated people about health and other issues. Catherine said she dreams of an environment fit for humans to live in. She said she believes in change.

Group 3

Our individual journey towards Easter may well be one of struggle, pain or some other similar situation.






