

## HISTORY OF HYMNS

n January 25<sup>th</sup>, we celebrate the Conversion of St Paul. St Paul isn't everyone's favourite Apostle as his letters included some difficult issues and one which can be quite controversial when placed in the context of the 21st Century.... but, putting all that on one side, try to place yourself as a bystander and witness of the utterly amazing events that happened on the road leading into Damascus. It would have been a relatively ordinary day in the life of the infant church in that area, but as it became known that Saul (Paul's pre-conversion name) was on his way, deep fear would have spread amongst the small Christian community.

As they prayed to God for protection, they probably weren't expecting quite such an amazing response to their prayers! Re-read Acts Chapter 9 vv 1-20 (-25) [and maybe even chapters 6 & 7 as well as the rest of 9] to relive the events of that day.

John Ellerton's hymn is all about this amazing moment of challenge and majors on the conquest of good over evil. It is very much of its period -Ellerton was a faithful parish priest, known now mostly for his hymnody, although it is anything but fashionable in style now. As long as you take the hymn to be of its own time and place it still achieves reminding us of the enormity of power of God over apparently insurmountable evil.

May your New Year be filled with God's hope and peace.



#### Where were you born?

I was born in Stourport – on – Severn, not because that's where my parents lived but because there were no beds in the local hospital. I was bought up in Bromsgrove.

#### What is you occupation?

I am currently a full-time student training for ordained ministry in the Anglican Church.

#### Why Kings Norton?

I worked at a mental health centre on the Hawkesley estate from 1986 – 1994. During this time I worked with a group of Christians, from a variety of denominations, who were experiencing mental health difficulties and who felt marginalised



The Co-Op staff lead the service and invite various other people to help. I felt very honoured to be invited. It was a very moving and emotional occasion as many people gathered to remember their loved ones who had passed away during the last twelve months.

 $3^{rd}$ 

I stood outside the school gate at Hawkesley Church Primary School to chat to parents and the children. It was a cold, bleak day but I always enjoy seeing everyone. Many parents are used to me being there on a Thursday morning now so often catch me for a chat. After I had finished at school, I went off on a pre-arranged home visit, but the person had gone out! At lunch time, I was invited to another Christmas lunch, this time with the Women's Fellowship. All I seemed to have done all week is eat!



toys and games. People passing by were invited to come and choose a gift to take away. Homeless people came in for scarves, gloves and jumpers. Grandparents found gifts for their grandchildren, tourists chose a souvenir, students took books and children found a new toy. As well as being given a gift, each of those people were welcomed into a building into which they can return to pray, had a conversation with someone who was able to listen to them for a few minutes and each one took away the impression of a loving and generous God whose greatest gift to them was not gift-wrapped but was born in humility at Christmas.

Equally, this year during inter-faith week, we have hosted an exhibition made by pupils at a Birmingham school looking at the story of Noah's Ark. We invited the 30 children and their parents to the launch of the exhibition where they mingled with the city's faith leaders, ate some canapés and were given a certificate and a small gift. Within a few minutes the parents and the children felt at home, many said they would come back to the Cathedral and several conversations about Christ took place in one evening. Throughout that week another 120 children from 6 schools came to the Cathedral, Surrounded by iconography and imagery that is now rarely seen outside churches, they explored the story of Noah's

Ark and its relevance to 21st Century global issues. The positive feedback has been overwhelming.

Our faith is lived out in all spheres of life. We cannot put our Gospel in a neat box marked 'spiritual' and only get it out when we are all sitting comfortably in church. Jesus' parables and miracles engaged directly with contemporary issues and concerns. Green issues are Gospel issues. Poverty issues are Gospel issues. Immigration is a Gospel issue. These issues do not detract from the Gospel of Jesus Christ but help us to be alongside those who are questioning, struggling and campaigning and so share the life of Jesus in the real world in which we all live.

I am as excited as ever about the Gospel of Jesus Christ and I want to live it, share it and nurture it in all its fullness. So let us all work and pray for a good deal at Copenhagen.



#### **GREETINGS FROM IMMANUEL CHURCH!**

You may have noticed at the St. Nicolas Day United Service that those at Immanuel are passing Mary and Joseph around the congregation. Here is some information about what Posada means and what it involves.

 $P \circ S \bigstar D A$ 

#### What is Posada?

Posada is an old Mexican tradition where young people dressed as Mary and Joseph travelled from house to house asking for a room for the night and telling people about the imminent arrival of Jesus in the weeks leading up to Christmas. On Christmas Eve they would visit the local church to re-enact the nativity and place figures of Mary and Joseph in a crib.

Modern day Posada uses nativity figures of Mary and Joseph who travel from place to place. This gives each 'host' the chance to create their own celebration in their home or place in the community, worshipping and reaching out to their communities with the real message of Christmas, making room for Jesus in their lives.

Our church has chosen to engage with Posada this year. Will you join us in thinking about the journey that Mary and Joseph face?

#### What is involved?

# **Epiphany**

The Epiphany is an ancient Christian feast day and is significant in a number of ways. In the East, where it originated, the Epiphany celebrates the Baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist in the River Jordan. It also celebrates Jesus' birth.

The Western Church began celebrating the Epiphany in the 4th Century where it was, and still is, associated with the visit of the magi (wise men) to the infant Jesus when God revealed himself to the world through the incarnation of Jesus.

For many Protestant church traditions, the season of Epiphany extends from 6th January until Ash Wednesday, which begins the season of Lent leading to Easter.

Other traditions, including the Roman Catholic tradition, observe Epiphany as a single day, with the Sundays following Epiphany counted as Ordinary Time.

The Epiphany is also known as Dia de los Reyes (Three Kings Day).







## KING'S NORTON - A History

Local history, like the church, is a funny thing. They both belong to us and we to them – but they also belong to many more other people who we do not and cannot know. They recover and re-tell past events and stories, but die if they are only nostalgia. They are also about the present day as we find and face it and about the future when (if you don't want to know the result, look away now) we too will be part of history and church tradition. And in local history, like the things of the church, there is always so much more to discover.

Our friends George and Stephen have therefore done something wonderful. With astonishing diligence, they have opened up for us landscape, records, buildings and events in King's Norton which we simply



did not know about. They resolve many mysteries. They build on the labours of others with great respect and affection. They give us the fruit of their long years of study and fascination with King's Norton. They help us to see its present in the light of its long, richly varied and often misunderstood past. But they do not try to take over. With the generosity of the true student, they invite others to help fill in the gaps in their story (there are still many) and later historians to develop their own research and insights.

#### New building In Kings Norton Is On The Right Track!

It's full steam ahead for the new Kings Norton retirement development on the site of St Nicolas Church Hall following the announcement that it will be called Awdry Court, in honour of the creator of the Thomas the Tank Engine books.

To decide the name for the development in St Nicolas Gardens, McCarthy & Stone invited local people to submit their ideas. Kings Norton resident Roger Parker suggested honouring Reverend Wilbert Awdry, a curate at St Nicolas' Church who invented the characters of Thomas and his friends to entertain his son Christopher in 1943.

Roger, 58, collected his prize of £150 at the new development and said: "As soon as I saw the competition to name the new development in the local paper I immediately thought of Awdry. I have always been amazed at how much pleasure Awdry's fantastic books about a little blue steam engine have given to so many generations of children, but how little there is to commemorate him and his work. I was absolutely delighted to find out I'd won the competition to name the development after Awdry. Aside from being a bit of a railway buff, I am proud to live in a city which has been home to such literary talents and am thrilled that Awdry has been honoured in this wonderful way."

Reverend Wilbert Awdry lived in Kings Norton from 1940 until 1946. To entertain his son Christopher during a bout of measles, Awdry made a model of a tank engine from odds and ends and painted it blue. Christopher christened the model engine Thomas and the following stories he requested about his new toy were published in 1946.



What do we discover? That some place-names (Lindsworth and Hawkesley) are very ancient indeed, that some roads (Green Lane, Icknield Street) have existed for over a thousand years, that everywhere ending in Heath really was waste and rough heath land for centuries and that The Green was a very different place until the last half-century. And we find that some settled roads are really new.

Most of all, George and Stephen help us to see inside King's Norton's buildings and land use and begin to grasp something of the people whose lives shaped them. What a varied crew they were - silent Cistercian monks, rowdy Mop attenders, buccaneering entrepreneurs, resilient farmers and peasants, craftsmen and women, shopkeepers, commuters to Birmingham, clergy (saintly and otherwise), pub-owners, nobles, MPs, destitute people – and a few ordinary ones as well. Has much changed?

George and Stephen's expertise as building historians also lets us realise how much has been lost since 1900 and how much is still there – but below the surface. They have unearthed new documents, and invited others to research them in detail - but these are nearly all for the last five hundred years. We still have much work to be done on the time when St Nicolas was built, extended and changed in its first four centuries. George and Stephen lead the way.

As with church, it's often tempting in local history to be most pre-occupied with the most recent past. George and Stephen's work tells us yet again that how we find our places and landscape now – and how we work to shape them for the future – depends as much on people and events from a far more distant past as on those in living memory.

There's much more to the past, present and future of King's Norton – and its church – than we think. Buy now through the Saint Nicolas Place shop – and be ready to discover.
