

From The Rector We all have a gift...

"the peace of God which passes all human understanding..."

What do we wish others at Christmas? In the land of Jesus' birth, we would say "Christmas Shalom" or "Christmas Salaam". Here, is it Happy, Merry - or what?

Shalom is the Jewish word for peace. Salaam is the Arabic. Both have the same root. They are still so close in sound – and in the yearning of so many who live there, of all faiths and none. For Christmas, what richer greeting could there be than the wishing of Shalom, Salaam, Peace for family, friend and neighbours?

And what could be stranger? Everything then, just as now, was as far from Christmas peace as we can imagine. Busy streets and markets; hotels and pubs overflowing; shoppers and party-goers now; people gathering for census then; political uncertainty and fear of strangers as strong then in different guise as it is now. The strife and pressure - of their travelling back home for census or in our travelling away for Christmas or in welcoming others - is not so different either.

For some, Christmas is not Happy – or Merry. Old or recent grief; a sense of being on the outside of others' merriment or of not having what others seem so easily to enjoy; the long list of tasks to be done; all make it hard for so many. Yet we all have a gift – the peace of God which passes all human understanding. Peace, Shalom, Salaam is not a wish for a good rest (although it might include it!) It is deep prayer that others may know – and we with them – the confidence that, in all the pressures, God is with us. Shalom is not the absence of strife. It is the state in which all things may become fruitful, generous and loving as God intends – a harmony of heart, mind and spirit whether in silence or in noise.

And it comes incomplete, ready for us to grasp and grow in. A perfect Christmas may be beyond us – but God in human form, the Christmas Child, brings something even better; love overflowing and waiting to be discovered in our stillness and in our turmoil..



May I wish you all a very Peaceful Christmas – one of Shalom and Salaam - in all the joy, pressure, memory and hope it brings. Do share with us in this story.

Christmas "Craft Fair" a Success

Kings Norton's annual Christmas Craft Fair on 11th November attracted a larger number of visitors than ever; with over 500 attending the event at St Nicolas Church. We made £1600 for Restoration Fund and the day's success has had an impact across the community. The church nave was built to house community life as well as worship and was clearly a home for all who came, many for their first visit to our church.

A record number of stalls, in total 34, including some first time attendees and many old favourites filled St Nicolas' Church. The Saracen's Head closure ready for the restoration work prompted the move to the church as an alternative venue. Stall owners really liked the different surroundings. The large visitor numbers show that the local community did too.

Visitors came from the 3 Estates and many areas of Birmingham, with some even travelling in from as far away as the Cotswolds. Stalls sold a large variety of gifts, the event having attracted entrepreneurs, artists, crafts people and small businesses offering jewellery, crystal, paintings, carvings and woodcrafts, games, cards and fashion accessories. For some stall owners the local craft fairs have turned into a valuable business opportunity with some leaving their jobs behind to focus full time on what had previously been hobbies.

Barbara Hedgeland, Craft Fair organiser, said: "I was amazed at the variety of high quality, individual pieces on display and it's been wonderful to see so many visitors again this year. I know many people will have come for a look around and instead have sorted their Christmas gift shopping early! It has been a hugely successful event and we are proud to support local craftspeople and at the same time enjoy the beautiful surroundings of the medieval church of St Nicolas."

Despite the event being at its busiest at 11 o'clock, the two minute silence for Remembrance Day was fully observed. The bustling and jostling quietened in an instant as we remembered together.

The next event planned by the Friends of Historic Kings Norton, also to raise money for the Restoration buildings is a 'Christmas Celebration' with Bournville Young Singers on Saturday December 16th, 2006. Proceeds in aid of the Bournville Young Singers and Kings Norton Restoration Fund.



The Mixed Economy Church – it's us!

"we are called to develop our existing churches and communities with their own traditions but also called to encourage and begin fresh expressions of church"

The what? A lot of people are talking about it. Maybe not in the places where it really matters - on the 49 bus, at Hawkesley School gate, Saturday morning coffee, discussion after worship or in the Golf Club, the Bull's Head or the queue at Spar — but certainly among those whose ideas and decisions affect the Church of England.

"Mixed economy church" comes from Archbishop Rowan. It has been taken up by many others. It is a key phrase in the newly published *The Future of the Parish System: Shaping the Church of England for the 21st Century.* What is it all about? Why?

We all know that the pressures on church resources and the decline of the place of older patterns of church-going mean that, in the words of our former Bishop, "We cannot go on as we are." But what sort of change must come?

Some would like us to cling very firmly to the patterns of worship, buildings and Christian living which we have received. Some would like us to change everything. It is so easy to paint those who agree with us as wonderful and those who disagree as either stuck in past mud or hooked on change for change's sake. Both are wrong. God's love is unchanging. The church isn't - because it contains and serves the countless stories of children, women and men growing and changing in God's love in societies which are themselves changing. There is no Golden Age to which we must return. There is no Bright Future awaiting us if only we scrap everything and start again. There is only Now - this time and this place in which we must cherish the past, be wholly open to God's future - and live in Christ.

The Future of the Parish System: Shaping the Church of England for the 21st Century contains deep understanding of the anxiety and stress that accompany the church and its members - but is much more about hope, which springs not from old or new ways of arranging the church's furniture, music and organisation but from being wholly "rooted in God's grace and mercy and faithfulness." And the book urges us to be the very kind of Mixed Economy Church discovered and growing in Kings Norton over the years; a church in which "we are called to develop our existing churches and communities with their own traditions but also called to encourage and begin fresh expressions of church" - in St Nicolas, Hawkesley, Immanuel and all along the 49 bus route. We are not separate congregations. We are sisters and brothers gathered together in Christ for Christ's purpose, with so much to learn from each other. We fail if we forget.

Formal church attendance may be less than it was. Faith isn't. The numbers who seek and live in God's life and love is no smaller – it's just that "church", both old or new, is not the first place that people look to as they explore life, its meaning and purpose. It can be – and will be - as we trust that we are called to be a Mixed Economy Church in which mission and maintenance, social action and evangelism, tradition and fresh expressions are not opposed but grow together in God's inclusive love.

Another new book, *Dancing with God*; the Anglican practice of hope, talks of four ways in which Anglican churches, including us, bear God's hope for the world; commitment to conversation especially in our differences; commitment to common prayer, whatever shape we prefer; acceptance of our fallibility and incompleteness without God and each other; willingness to explore and cross new thresholds without fear. As we do these by God's grace, we have hope; for ourselves, for the church – and crucially for the world.



We hope that you have a very happy Christmas.



The Revd Martin Leigh

The Revd Martin Leigh, Team Rector of Kings Norton (1992-9) and then Vicar of Cheddleton in Staffordshire and Rural Dean of Leek, died on 29th October after a short illness. Many here will miss him greatly. He was Rector during a difficult time. Everyone who lived through them will have their memories own and recollections, all of which, with Martin and his family, we need to place into the hands of Christ, his loving Redeemer and ours In his diocese of Lichfield, Martin's life and ministry has been recalled by the Bishop, the Rt Revd Jonathan Gledhill. His words gather much of what those who grieve for Martin here will know. He said:

"It was a great shock to us all when we heard that Martin was dying of cancer. In the last two years he had had serious operations on each of his shoulders and had nearly died of an infection in hospital - but had been recuperating well at last. To have only a few weeks preparation for death was quite unexpected.

Martin was a devoted parish priest and pastor. He served curate in Lambeth as (Southwark) and Bakewell. as priest-in-charge of Over as vicar of Haddon. Ockbrook and Baslow (all in Derbyshire) and as Team Rector of Kings Norton (Birmingham) before coming to Cheddleton. He spent time in a Christian ashram in India and his gifts were widely used in each of his dioceses. He was elected to lead the House of Clergy in Derbyshire for 15 years.

Martin was a scholar-priest with wide spiritual and i n t e l l e c t u a l interests. Whether it was writing a spiritual companion to John Moschos' The Spiritual Meadow, reading the Office in Greek, or thinking aloud about history and literature, he was

fascinated by it all. He will be deeply missed in Cheddleton a n d Leek. Martin was unafraid to die and enjoyed his last week, at home with his family gathered round him, putting his funeral service together and appreciating those he loved most. He leaves behind his wife Mary, also a priest and teacher of ordinands, and his children, whom he was to devoted. We give God thanks for Martin and mourn his loss."

Please pray for God's healing and peace for Mary and her family - and for one another.

Associates found four species of bat in both buildings – the Common Pipistrelle, the Soprano Pipistrelle, the Brown Long Eared Bat and the Natterer's Bat. The bat boxes needed to be in position in the churchyard before work can start on the buildings at the beginning of November. Thank you to everyone who made sure that they were. Not least, Richard Harper and John Bowen.

Calling all Bookworms

In the Parish of Kings Norton, there are many Bookworms. There are also a great-deal of books stacked up in our various homes. On top of it all there are lots of people with an interest in Church life, faith, Christianity, theology, history, and what it means to be a Christian today. We are exploring the idea of building a Parish 'e-library' where our books can be shared around the parish but stored in our own homes. We think it would increase our knowledge, aid our education about Church life and community and raise our awareness of different points of view and of the history of the Christian faith.

The idea is to be made 'safe' by the development of a web-based system only accessible through the supply of e-mail addresses and issuing of 'passwords'. The web page would automatically direct e-mail requests from interested people to the book-owner without disclosing the e-mail address of the book owner. The owner of the book, having registered the book will then be able to loan the book to the person concerned without necessarily making their contact details known. The process could possibly take place through the Church building remotely, or in person. The web page will store details of all the books people register and will tell people how many books are held and hold an alphabetical list of books.

We anticipate it being largely a service used within the congregations of the Parish, J but interest may be much wider, we just don't know. Hopefully it will build communication between people and we hope to develop a web-based chat room.



The idea is under construction and don't panic if you don't have access to the web; obviously a paperbased list of all the books and a manual way of doing this for people not using computers will be made available.

I was having a look on the Internet for something to do with Advent but instead I found an American site that


talked all about a Chrismon Tree. Now I may be a lot older than you but I still love learning about new things so I read on.

The Chrismon Tree tradition was started by a lady called Frances Spencer. She lived in Virginia in America and she was a professional tree decorator. In 1957 she was asked to decorate the Christmas tree at her church and because she wanted to make it special she made lots of white and gold decorations all based around Christian signs and symbols. She made stars to remind people of the star that stopped over the stable, a little dove to show peace, a

crown to show Jesus as King and many more. The people who saw her tree thought it was very beautiful and wanted to make their own. Frances had to give the decorations a name so she called them Chrismons from 'CHRISt MONOgram' (a monogram is usually someone's initials used as decoration) Frances told them that she would show them how to make the Chrismons but she said that they must never be sold to make money, so even though many people in America now have a Chrismon tree at Christmas time you will never see the Chrismons in a shop to buy.

Here are some pictures of beaded Chrismons and some paper ones which you can colour and hang on your own tree at Christmas. Trace them onto paper, back them on card and punch out a hole with a hole punch to thread some thin string or wool through. Enjoy.




