

#### From The Rector "We are in the middle of a very busy - and hopeful - time..."

"Not the beginning of the end but the end of the beginning,"; Sir Winston Churchill after the Second World War turning point of El Alamein. We keep seeking perfection now. It may whisper briefly in a perfect day, a task well done, a conversation in which all is said well and warmly, but we know underneath that there is always more to come, of sorrow and of joy, of despair and hope, in the changes and chances of the world. We may want to feel that, at last, we are at the beginning of the end. We are much more at the end of the beginning; the point where all begins to make sense – and brings much more to do, to dream and to learn.

Each year, from Advent to now, the church unfolds the story of Jesus; his birth, life, dying and rising two thousand years ago in Palestine. Is that it? The story of Jesus' earthly life and ministry seems to end at the Ascension with him passing out of his friends' sight on the Mount of Olives followed by the promised outpouring of the Holy Spirit ten days later at Pentecost. (Acts 1 and 2 tell the story). But that is only the end of the beginning.

It is tempting to think that our purpose in church is simply to tell this amazing story and follow it year by year with familiar festivals and ceremonies. But as we do this from Advent to now, are there not some questions to startle and delight?

Jesus kept talking about the Kingdom of God. It's here. It's now – and it is coming in greater fullness. He kept promising that the work he did would not end but be carried on through his friends. He kept reminding people through story and action of all that God wants in justice, mercy, welcome and new beginnings. The story of Jesus does not stand still in the world of two thousand years ago. It is not limited to the life of the church – or to things we call holy. It bursts out of all the limits and restraints we try to put on it. Jesus' earthly ministry brought upright people face to face with those they were leaving out – and brought those who felt rejected face to face with a living promise that they were truly loved, welcomed and full of worth. It still does – and through the gift of the Holy Spirit to the church – the story still calls us out of where we are with the promise that by God's grace and gift alone, the same word and work of Jesus is alive now – and for ever – with so much more still to come. This is just the beginning.

We are in the middle of a very busy - and hopeful time. Confirmation. Fresh Expressions, Restoration, New Deal - and so much else that does not have capital letters in its name - all bring new things to the telling of our ancient story. Changes in the clergy team as Heather retires and Rebecca Pulling arrives in July; new beginnings on Druids Heath with Karen Urwin, a new Head at Hawkesley School; discovering wider and richer use for St Nicolas during construction: making new friendships; deepening all that we offer in worship - and in baptisms, marriages and funerals. And so much more!

If all that we are doing is to keep alive a story which ended two thousand years ago, we shall simply be tired, inward, anxious and fearful about the future of the church – and ourselves. But as Bishop David says, "The task of the Church is to serve the Kingdom of God." – a Kingdom of Life which was, and is, and is to come. We will find rest, refreshment and renewal in that story of God's Kingdom made alive through Jesus – and find more than enough to share confidently with others as Jesus did. He still does, and promises more, through this story which is so old – and yet has only just begun, alleluia!

# Kings Norton Ringers Outing 2007

#### "We arrived back at the Parish Hall by nine o'clock, in the expected manner, tired but happy."

On the 12th May a group of 30 bell ringers, parishioners and friends set off on the ringer's annual outing, this year to the Cotswolds. Inevitably it started to rain as we were travelling to Broadway, the first of our five stops, but we were blessed as it stopped when we arrived. As the church was a little way outside the village, most of the non-ringers took the opportunity to get off in the village centre, whilst the rest of us travelled on to a lovely little church in the middle of the countryside. The church was different from the rest we visited, as there was no ringing chamber. The bells were rung from the chancel, and the first job of the day was to move the choir pews so that we could stand in the right places to ring.

After Broadway we moved to Winchcombe, an appropriate place to visit this year, as 2007 marks the millennium of the date when it became the county town of Winchcombeshire. Unfortunately this only lasted for ten years. Once again we were blessed as the heavy rain we experienced in driving from Broadway miraculously turned into bright sunshine on arriving at the church. Winchcombe proved to be a popular shopping stop for some of the group.

We moved on to Bourton on the Water, where we took lunch, and several of the ringers took the opportunity to replenish their fluid levels in some of the friendly hostelries besides the water. The bells were most enjoyable, and the town proved a popular place for the rest of the group.

Moreton in Marsh church has strong links with the Fire Service Guild of Bellringers, as the town is the home of the Fire Service College, and headquarters of the Institution of Fire Engineers, and there are peal boards in the ringing chamber to mark peals rung by the Guild. For those not aware, a peal consists of more than 5000 changes rung over a period of about 3 hours, and peal boards are erected to record special events. There are several in our own tower marking various events, including Molly Barron's 50 years as a ringer at Kings Norton.


We ended the day at Chipping Camden, which has a most spectacular church, with an imposing tower, visible for many miles, and the heaviest bells of the day. Even though the ringers were a bit tired by now, the ringing was of good quality. After this we retired to the Red Lion for further refreshment and an enjoyable and relaxing supper. The journey home was slightly longer than anticipated, but we did have another opportunity to view the tower at Chipping Camden once more, this time from a different perspective. We arrived back at the Parish Hall by nine o'clock, in the expected manner, tired but happy. I hope that this may encourage more of you to join us on the second Saturday in May next year, when we will have yet another Kings Norton ringers outing.

# A Taste of Indonesia

"They are not allowed to talk about their faith so they try to live it out by showing love to their neighbours."

I recounted last month how some of the STT Abdi Sabda students in Medan from Nias were affected particularly by the post tsunami earthquake and were unable to return home or get news of their families.

The college union raised funds – by rattling buckets at passing terrifyingly busy traffic - for a few students to travel over, carrying as much rice, oil and water as they could manage and to assess the situation and bring back news. Most left behind could neither afford to go home nor stay on in Medan.

Slowly things on Nias are returning to some sort of normality 2 years on. The government is building a main airport to facilitate aid and supplies. Cranes and other vital rescue equipment are being ferried round the island to enter through a new port. The students mainly look to the Lord for maintenance. One young man came to his teacher to say that he didn't even have a few coins for a bowl of rice to eat. She had in her hand a letter just arrived from one of the short term workers, saying that some money was on its way to help some of the students. She was able to advance him some funds so that he could eat and pay half a term's fees. That's living on the edge with God alright! The Indonesian government paid for those needing medical treatment as a result of the tsunami and earthquake to be taken to hospital in Medan. Medicines, surgery and consultations were covered but not food and other things normally done by family. Many from a long distance had no-one to look after them. Some of the staff and students raised funds to buy bottles of water and packets of biscuits for patients, and sit and talk to them. An old lady said that she had everything she needed but she longed for a hot cup of tea in the morning. With their last few coins they were able to buy her a little vacuum flask. They are not allowed to talk about their faith so they try to live it out by showing love to their neighbours.

I'll tell you more about life in Medan soon. If you feel moved to give a contribution, it can be sent out through the church to *omf* who will ensure that it goes straight to the recipients. Contact Thelma Mitchell for details on 07836 650834.





# Restoration New Discoveries!

As the building work goes on, we are discovering more and more of what lies underneath some very familiar spaces. We didn't know - but we do now - that underneath the Parish Office is a large area of cobbled flooring and foundations laid over seven hundred years ago. Behind the East front, facing The Green, we have uncovered the original 1492 gables and beams - for the first time in over two hundred years. They show that when the Tudor house was turned into an inn in the late eighteenth century, the builders hid a very fine timber frontage, just like the one we are used to seeing on the North Side facing the churchvard. We are also finding remains of very early fireplaces behind the gas fires in the Parlour, the Queen's Room and the Parish Office.

It tells us that there is so much more to our buildings than we ever imagined. We find that we have a large and impressive Tudor house, built on much earlier foundations. We find that the story of Kings Norton has even deeper and older roots that we knew. We find that there was clearly an impressive house before the house we can now see - and that when the nave of St Nicolas was built - and possibly The Green laid out, there was a rich and busy settlement here. It is a pity that building work means that site access is very restricted - but everything is being recorded - and we are changing some of the plans to ensure that as much as possible will be visible in the Restored buildings. And we have only just started the same kind of investigation into the Old Grammar School. All this is happening as we move steadily onwards in developing exciting and workable new uses for the Restored buildings, alongside what we have been used to doing.

The Church of England has a web site dedicated to climate change and how we should respond to it. Named after the initiative,

www.shrinkingthefootprint.cofe.anglican .org sets out how we are to become 'The 40% Church' – reducing our carbon emissions to 40% of current levels by 2050. The site gives details of how we can measure our current footprint, use energy more efficiently, switch to green energy, generate renewable energy and offset our carbon emissions. There is also a link to the email address for Birmingham's Diocesan Environment Officer who is on hand to give advice.

A book on the subject has also recently been published called 'How Many Lightbulbs Does It Take To Change A Christian?' As well as measuring the Parish's carbon footprint you can also measure your own at **www.myfootprint.org** by answering a few simple(ish) questions. #### Jess Boultons Reflections on Confirmation Service

It is tempting to write something littered with superlatives about the Confirmation Service at St Nicolas on 13th May 2007. But all the adjectives in the cosmos would sound trite. I could say that I found it 'moving' or 'wonderful' or 'marvellous' or 'beautiful' but none of these do justice to the shared experience. I would love to write eloquently about the 'astounding' liturgy, the 'fabulous' ritual but it would bore you to death.

The Confirmation Service was most affecting in that it was full of very ordinary people. This is what made it special to me and the very ordinariness of us all experiencing something so extraordinary was overwhelming. Many of us were moved to tears. I certainly remain very



emotional with our shared experiences so fresh in my mind. I am crying as I write this because it is a shock to be offered such a privilege as to be a part of such beauty. In the time we spent together we ordinary people were not separate at all, we were people engaged in each other's lives and stories.

We cared so much for each other, wanted so much for each other and yet a few months beforehand many of us didn't know one another at all. The candidates themselves were a group of people sharing with their Church one of the most intimate experiences of their lives. It was a gift to be a part of this. I have said that we were ordinary and you might wonder what is so exciting about that. It is exciting because Jesus comes to ordinary people; I know this, because he came to me. Being ordinary does not imply being mundane (I hope). Being ordinary means sharing in humanity and the created world. Being ordinary means being diverse but together; it means having incredible stories to tell about how we have experienced life on earth in this time and place. Being ordinary means waiting for the bus in the pouring rain and forgetting your umbrella, crying and raging and laughing and loving. An ordinary human screams for help when in pain or fear, yells at God and questions the existence of the divine, prays fervently for those they love. Ordinary people like you and me sometimes feel confused and find no meaning in our existence. Occasionally ordinary people think we cannot carry on living because life seems too bleak for survival and because we are too tired and depleted.

Being ordinary is important because it is the ordinary person and their experience of life that the overwhelming love of Christ embraces. Being ordinary is about being human and this means being the recipient of God's passion. For God ordinary is fabulous. God sees what we perceive as run-of-themill as the most sacred creation. When we lose our socks and exceed our overdraft limit and get fed up with changing nappies or see brutality and cruelty, God thinks we are fascinating beings. God sees us full of potential and ripe for transformation. Jesus comes and gets his hands dirty in the drudge of daily life. To think of us as precious, when we look in the mirror and see nothing special, seems ridiculous to us.

As we sat together, there were those previously confirmed sitting with those buzzing with anticipation at their own ceremony. There were those families and friends who loved the candidates and were there for their special day and those of no religious affiliation at all. We shared tissues, tears and laughter. I cannot speak for them, but I felt that we stopped seeing our ordinary selves as we see ourselves and saw each other as God sees us. This is what happened to me anyway. There we were in our basic human forms realising that what we saw before us was in fact full of God's promise. The stories we had told about the sadness and regret and the joys of our past and present were imbued with the life force of the creator of the universe. I can't speak for others, but I felt aware all over again that God thought ordinary people were amazing, that I thought ordinary people were amazing, and that in our ordinary lives the most extraordinary experience had happened. God had touched us because God wanted to touch us and I was intensely glad about that.




