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

From The Rector "Place = Space + Flow!!!"

"We who are at home in St Nicolas are very varied already – but so many more seek and do not yet find..."

It weighs on me that our life as God's people now requires us to give more committed prayer and thought to St Nicolas, our main building, and to seek new fullness of all that it offers in the mission of God. I'm not only thinking of its physical care or of its primary use for public worship – although, with the end of Restoration in sight, our energies and vision must be given more to both. My worry is that for each of us the vision for our precious building seldom goes outside the personal. It is so easy to say, "I know what it means to me," without wondering what it means to others. If we asked them, we might be very surprised – and I hope delighted. Our story matters, but it is not the only one

The great strength of St Nicolas, past gift and present reality. is the unbelievable variety of prayer, story, experience, emotion, worship, work and wonder it shelters inspires. So many have met here. prayed here and been strengthened by God's grace over the centuries. It still happens and in so many different ways for so many different

people. It is a generous building – a truly holy space because within it, in all our variety of faith, experience and need, we can discover and be renewed in God's holiness, the wholeness of body, mind and spirit in our own living and in our living together as God's people which his loving will for all.

But this great strength has two weaknesses. It is easy to take for granted that a space which usually allows me to pray, worship and meet in the ways I prefer also gives the same kind of space to many others who are very different. There is usually room for us all to go on in our own way with our own feelings about what should and should not happen — and only occasionally to face the simple fact that others, equally faithful, seek and find something very different here.

Our growth as faithful disciples means that we must make room for them. The generous space of St Nicolas and its life actually means that this isn't usually a hard task. We don't often need to notice what others might be seeking or doing. But sometimes we meet it face to face. It can be difficult and we can find ourselves being suddenly much less secure and more anxiously judgmental than we - or God – want us to be. It's hard.

The second weakness is that our richness of variety can make us complacent. "Look at the differences we already contain. Surely that's enough?" If we read the Gospel stories we find that it isn't. Look at Luke Chapter 15. 99 sheep, nine coins, a faithful son; surely they were enough to make a shepherd; a housewife and a father not mind losing one. For Jesus, they weren't. The lost sheep, coin and son were more important than those remaining. A growing faithful church needs us to feel the same. It's hard.

We who are at home in St Nicolas are very varied already – but so many more seek and do not yet find. They are anxious about coming in through a narrow door. They may bring concerns too heavy to bear. Past experience of church for many has been deeply hurtful. Ways of worship familiar to us can seem very

strange indeed to those who are first meeting them. And many more have such little trust in their own worth that they find it hard to believe that such an imposing building can possibly have a space for them.

But it does, alleluia. Through our opening on Wednesday and Saturday mornings, Thursday evenings and around services — with hospitality generously offered in different ways — we have had the huge privilege of enabling so many more to find their rightful space in their — and our - parish church.

Much of this has been helped by all that we have discovered through Candlelit Church on Wednesday evenings from 6.30pm - 8pm. It may not be what everyone needs or wants (it isn't) but for so many already it has been a place in which new relationship with church has begun - starting with a tentative push at the door and a welcome to be as you are, not as others wish you to be. And for so many old hands, including me, it is a place of renewal and fresh discovery in faith and affirmation. God is very present - as at Tiny Tots, at our quiet 8am Communion, at main services, baptisms, weddings and funerals - and everything else in St Nicolas. But at Candlelit Church, so many find a way in - and it is bearing fruit in their lives and in our life as a whole church.

Ann Morisy is a startling theologian who has spent 25 years working with many churches in London to help them face up to and grow in the challenge of being God's church within their local communities, just like us. To her, the parish church building is vital as a very special place in God's mission. She talks of "Place = space + flow". This may sound strange – but it contains a truth we all know but perhaps too little admit.

To Ann, what makes a place rich and special is first the space – all that marks it out in walls or fences or whatever – and second the flow of people around and through it at different times in the day, the week or the year. We know what this means on The Green, from early morning to late at night, from deliveries and school traffic, through morning shoppers and hungry

lunchtimes to the evening flows around church, Spar and the Bull's Head. It is just the same with St Nicolas itself (and Hawkesley and Immanuel!). Think of the flows of people in and around them at different times of day, week or year. Each of us is in only a few - yet God is in them all.

The more the flows in and around a space, the more it grows as a special place. Some church buildings have only one flow a week with a few trickles at other times. We are blessed with all kinds of flows at all kinds of times — each just as important as another. Some flows are of people we find difficult or strange. Some are very congenial. Some we are at home in, others not. But all are loved by God.

Ann writes, "Our churches are really just old, holy, tents that have resisted the most brutal of flows throughout their history. We are mistaken when we think that they have to be protected and preserved against today's flows, even when the flows are of distressed and embattled people. In fact, it is precisely in these situations that our buildings display their potency."

I believe that she is right and that, for this precious building at the heart of our parish's mission and ministry, we can be confident there is much more to discover of its use, growth, shelter and inspiration for many, many more people doing many different things...

This year, may I invite you to celebrate St Nicolas over a special weekend. St Nicolas Day as always is on December 6th. Two days after, on Saturday 8 December, we shall be having an Open Day to celebrate the re-opening of the Old Grammar School alongside and an Open Day and Gift Day for St Nicolas itself, with special invitations to services on the Sunday. Please claim your place with everyone else in the flows which make this space such a special place for past, present and future. We need to remember always that it is not our feelings but God's faithfulness which make St Nicolas what it is – and God always promises so much more.

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St Nicolas: Sunday worship in November



Please Note Date Change for Annual Memorial Service

Please note that the above annual memorial service will now be on Sunday 11th November at 4pm, NOT 4th November as previously advertised. This is to enable clergy and others to attend the memorial service for Bishop John Austin which is at the Cathedral on 4th November at 3pm.

If "place = space + flow", then St Nicolas will be an even more special place than usual in November, with all sorts of different flows just around Sunday worship.

Every Sunday, the 8am Holy Communion uses the Prayer Book of 1662 which until 30 years ago was in common use throughout the Church of England. Its quiet dignity is a rich source of feeding and inspiration for all who have grown into its familiar words – which often sets them up for more contemporary services at other times.

At 10.30am on 4th, 18th and 25th November, we shall have our regular Communion Service with Oasis for 4-11 year olds but each one is different. 4th November is All Saints Sunday a day to celebrate the company of all who have gone before us in the life of faith and now celebrate with us heaven. On 18th November there will be a baptism in the service - to remind us all of the promise God has made to us in our own. 25th November is the feast of Christ the King, the last Sunday of the Christian Year a good time to look back in thanksgiving and repentance and to look forward in hope.

Remembrance Sunday is of course on 11th November. Our 10.30am service will be the Parade and Remembrance Service with the Two Minutes Silence and laying of wreaths to remember and hold dear all who have died in war.

At 4pm is our Annual Memorial Service for those whose funerals have been taken in the past year through the parish, with their families and friends invited. Please keep this service in your prayers, along with our Parish Bereavement Visitors who organize it.

Our monthly Holy Communion with Prayers for Healing follows at 6pm. Each year we use this service to remember thankfully all those who have died who have loved us and shone with Christ's light in our own lives. If you would like someone to be remembered by name in this service, please ring the Parish Office on 458 3289.

The other Sunday evening 6pm services are special too.

St Nicolas will also of course be full at 3.15pm on November 4th and November 18th for our familiar Baptism services – another time of God's welcome in this special place.

In September a small group of us went to lona for a week. What an amazing time we had. Lots of laughter, glorious scenery, good weather. The group of older people who meet there have made us feel very welcome. On 10th October the group played Bingo and I heard things I have never heard before, for instance, the Bingo caller said '33 all the threes' to which everyone responded 'fish chips and peas.' Another number was called, (I didn't hear what it was) and everyone responded with a 'whistle!' Can anyone tell what number it is for a 'duck with a cough'?!

6th:

Guess who made an appearance in my kitchen at 11.00 pm? Yes, you guessed it a slug. Note the word 'a.' At least this time it wasn't a whole family. I soon disposed of him!

8th:

I am a real baby when I have to have blood taken at the surgery. I have very poor veins. So I was not looking forward to going to see the doctor, because I knew what was coming. I nearly ran out of the door when he suggested taking it out of my hand! No way! Anyway he got it out of my arm but then made my day by calling me a 'young woman.' So all was forgiven.

9th

I was helping to lead a 'Praying in Worship' session at St. Nicolas church. It turned out to be a really lovely evening as we prayed in different and perhaps more creative ways. The bell ringers were hard at work which added to the atmosphere and reminded me of how bells were often used in the past to call people to prayer.

A man came up to me on The Green for a chat. We talked about the church and various things. The conversation was gentle and good. As I moved to go he suddenly kissed me on the cheek. I was very touched by the gesture. An elderly man feeling he could kiss a woman wearing a dog collar, how lovely.

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
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Restoration Old Grammar School is a Big Step Forward

At last, re-opening draws near. The Saracen's Head will not be ready until Easter but the Old Grammar School is ready to be handed back to us in November. You can already see what the difference in the outside - but the inside is beginning to look even better. The rich atmosphere is the same but the building is also restored, dry, useable - and warm! The plasterers and masons in particular have worked wonders - but so have the carpenters and everyone else.

There will be some tours and events from mid-November - but the first chance for most of us to see all that has happened will be on Saturday 8th December 10am - 3pm alongside the Church Open Day. Thomas Hall himself will be here in person to ensure that we are learning hard. Around lunchtime there will be a service of Thanksgiving and Blessing. Please look out for details - as they become clearer.



One thing that is still not clear is how this remarkable building came to be as it is. We know it was there by around 1660 and housed Thomas Hall's library - but all the parts are much older, some going back to around 1430. Research goes on. What will the answer be?

Val and John Haynes, two of the few original inhabitants of St Nicolas Gardens, are moving to Weston-Super-Mare this month. They have been involved in the life of the parish for over 35 years; running the Book Room, caring for the Churchyard, Women's Evening Fellowship to name but a few. They took a rest from packing to be interviewed by their son, Alan.

Where were you born?

John – Tonbridge in Kent, I was the son of a School Teacher in a family with a long line of Teachers but I had no inclination to follow in their footsteps.

Val – Hall Green, but moved to London when I was only 11 months old so consider myself to be a Londoner as I lived there until we married and moved to Thornbury, Bristol.

What were your occupations?

John – After studying for a degree in Mathematics at Kings College, London I worked in the Aerodynamics Department of Handley Page Ltd. I moved to the British Aircraft Corporation in Filton, Bristol when we got married and then to International Computers Ltd in London a few years later before coming to Birmingham in 1971. I worked as a Computer Manager at the University of Birmingham's Academic Computing Services until I retired in 1996.

Val – After leaving school with A levels I became Secretary to the Editor of 'Country Life' magazine and then secretary to the Deputy Director of Berkeley Nuclear Laboratories. I too worked at the University of Birmingham when we moved, in the Medical School, Registry and Law Faculties. During this time I obtained a First Class Honours Degree with the Open University and then became the Registrar of Westhill College. I retired in 1997.

How did you meet?

At the Bloomsbury Coffee Pot, this met at the YWCA in Great Russell Street, London. We were both involved in the organising committee.

Why Kings Norton?

We were looking for somewhere convenient for the University and found out about a new development being built in a vicarage garden. We moved here in 1971, when Tony Balmforth was vicar and have lived here ever since. We are one of only three original occupants of St Nicolas Gardens.

What do you delight in?

John – Classical music, puzzles and generally things which exercise the brain.

Val – Theatre, ballet, reading and all things historical. I have followed Restoration with interest and have made many friends in the Women's Fellowship and Book Circle.

What was the inspiration behind the Book Room?

It was started by Peter and Margaret Wellings. When they left we were approached by Rob Morris to see if we would take it over. We ran and developed it for over five years until the Saracen's Head closed. The Book Room raised over £8,000 for Church funds. Val had always wanted to run a bookshop and we made many friends through it.

What is your favourite film/music?

Val – From this year, Helen Mirren in 'The Queen' and 'Amazing Grace'. I have always enjoyed Handel's music and have good memories of listening to Alan and Rachel, two of our children, when they sung in the church choir.

John – I was a fan of 'The Prisoner' series on television and enjoy listening to music by Elgar and Mozart.

Like Desert Island Disks what would be your luxury and book?

Val – I would like endless paper and pens to write my first novel and any book by Rose Tremaine.

John – A solar powered music centre to play the records on and the collected detective works of Margery Allingham.

What is the point of Christianity for you? John – I have been Agnostic from the age of 5, but enjoy looking after the fabric of Church and its surroundings.

Val – For me religion is a private thing, but I believe that the two great commandments provide a good blueprint for life. There must be a Creator, even if it was to create the 'big bang' and so it is right to give thanks. I find the 8am service at St Nicolas a dignified and reverent way to celebrate and I enjoy the language of the Book of Common Prayer.

Do you have any regrets?

We are sad that we will not be seeing our friends from Kings Norton so often once we have moved, but we are not far away in Weston and will be coming back from time to time.

What is your best memory?

The safe arrival of and holding each of our newborn children and grandchildren.

What are your hopes for the church in Kings Norton?

Restoration is very exciting. The new facilities becoming available provide opportunities to move forward. Also, the proposed building developments at Hawkesley School and a new Head Teacher are encouraging signs for the future. We have enjoyed our time in Kings Norton and wish everyone well.

What do you plan to do with the rest of your lives?

We are looking forward to the opportunities that come with our move to Weston, building new friendships and new activities to enjoy. Hopefully keeping healthy and agile in both mind and body.

On behalf of all the team at this magazine, and of the friends of Val and John, may we wish them both a wonderful future as they start new adventures in their new home in Weston. May we thank them too, for the friendship, love and kindness that they have shared with us all... and for their sterling work for our parish throughout the years.



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

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CHURCHYARD CLEAR-UP




Every year it is necessary to clear the areas close to St Nicolas Church, raking up and collecting all the leaves that fall in such profusion primarily during the month of November.

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Conversion on Wychall Lane!

Oh how even the least environmental of us can change.....

When I came to Kings Norton in 2005, it was with an understanding of the need for change in matters environmental but that that change should occur somewhere out there, with governments, big corporations and those who polluted most... what was I to do? I contributed little to the global warming we heard so much about.

I became interested in the work of the Prayer and World Needs Group (PAWNS). The way that a small group of people could persistently bring to our attention, as church, the issues of poverty, justice, environment and aspiration to change, that we should think through these serious issues and make changes. Strangely, in my experience, the PAWNS group seemed less interested in large numbers coming to their meetings than in people changing their thinking in small but significant ways, actually becoming part of the process of change on a wider scale not just, though important, changing a light bulb.

Then, like somebody had switched on the light a bit for me, I had to recognise that I had to look at this for myself, that there were changes I could make which were serious, significant, perhaps small, but they contributed to a greater whole, a bigger picture, that was not to continue the idea, going to be painted, at least my part was not unless I got on and did my part.

So where am I on all this two and a half years later? The petrol is now the clean unleaded, yes its dearer, but a lot of the difference can be made up by easing back on the right pedal and anyway, saving personal expenditure is not the only guide to what is green or clean or just. Some, not all of the light bulbs are now energy

efficient. I cannot quite accept that I should work in poor light even though others have no light at all... I know! We are about to change to an energy supplier that uses renewable energy and thanks to Gill the move to a more ethical bank has begun. If it's good enough for Birmingham City Council to use the Co-op why dare any of us choose otherwise? Coffee, tea and cleaning materials have all changed, its simple really, even the big supermarkets are stocking the goods that are fairer traded or fairer to the planet. You cannot buy nicer bread, or get a better cup of coffee than at the Deli in Mary Vale Road so why buy less, often for more?

I admit my change of heart began with the pocket, changing some light bulbs. But it has become slowly and painfully clearer that this is not an option that somehow we as Christian people need to point to and live this Kingdom of God we preach and read of and part of that in this consumer driven country is to say we can make changes that are kingdom changes. We can and should choose greener, fairer traded alternatives, choose locally produced goods where we can and not worry that the problem seems bigger than the part we can do, we should be doing what we can and what I have learnt since coming here is there is an awful lot I can do now, more that can be done down the line and most importantly of all that it is about choosing to do this because it is right.

My thanks to PAWNS for their faithful raising of issues, their patient prayer for us all and for their having the courtesy and tact to encourage this very slow convert on the Wychall Lane. Do speak to the PAWNS Group and find out more.

I resolved to try writing something helpful – and then started reading a book I bought on

lona simply because it is by Nancy Cocks who was the MacLeod Centre Warden on the island from 2002-4 - and a dear friend. Her introduction is exactly what I was looking for and thinking of trying to write. Nancy does it!

The book itself is a collection of her sermons and dialogues for specific services and occasions in the Abbey - which are worth the money in themselves. Christian Wisdom: Desiring God and Learning in Love

I told myself I had to read this by the deadline date for the November magazine and I have failed, I have only managed the first eighty nine pages so doubly short! Why then do I want to commend this to you? Because I have found it hard but riveting, opening of many new understandings and really gripping as the novels always have on them in the summer! So why would anybody want to read this who is not a theologian or studying

theology? Because it brings alive in such a fresh way the whole way that scripture, the Bible, is approached. In particular Luke's gospel, which has been the subject of our 10.30am services for many weeks now.

The first section of the book deals with an exploration of what we understand as being Christian Wisdom, with the unwrapping of

so many places where wisdom cries from the pages of the scripture providing for us a means of accessing the text that moves it from being the pages of a manual, dry, unrelenting and to be avoided to a narrative that is part of our experience, that merges with our experience and has us caught up in the bigger narrative that is God in and through all.



The principles that are explored are timeless and could be applied our reading of the bible in a detailed searching of texts or a more straight forward reading. I am amazed at the skill of the author as he makes such difficult concepts come to life and then take us as readers almost by the hand into things one would not have dreamt of trying to understand. Perhaps that is one of the qualities you need to be Regius Professor of Divinity at Cambridge.....

Only eighty nine pages but they have been rich reading and I will try and finish with an update for the next issue. Beware though if you try and get a copy, it's not on some lists yet but Waterstones and Blackwells in Oxford have it on-line! If you only buy it and read chapter two it will have been worth the £15.99!



Guy Fawkes and the Houses of Parliament

Queen Elizabeth I had treated Catholics very badly because she thought that there should be no Catholics only Protestants. When she died in 1603, English Catholics hoped that King James I would be kind to them. James I had, after all, had a Catholic mother. Unfortunately, James did not turn out to be any better than Elizabeth and a number of young men, 13 to be exact, decided that something had to be done.



A small group got together. Their leader was a man called Robert Catesby. Catesby decided to blow up the Houses of Parliament. In doing so, they would kill the King, maybe even the Prince of Wales, and the Members of Parliament who were making life difficult for the Catholics. Today these men would be called terrorists.

To carry out their plan, the men got hold of 36 barrels of gunpowder - and stored them in a cellar, just under the Parliament.

But as the group worked on the plot, some of them realised that other people they knew, who had been kind to them, would be hurt too. One of the groups sent a letter warning his friend, Lord Monteagle, to stay away from the Parliament on November 5th.

The warning letter reached the King, and the King's soldiers started to search the cellars.

Guy Fawkes, who was in the cellar of the parliament with the 36 barrels of gunpowder when the authorities stormed it in the early hours of November 5th, was caught, tortured and killed.

On that very same night: November 5th, 1605, bonfires were set alight to celebrate the

safety of the King. Since then, November 5th has become known as Bonfire Night. The event is commemorated every year with fireworks and burning straw men called 'Guys' on a bonfire.

When I listen or read this story I find myself wondering who was right. Guy Fawkes and his friends wanted to stop people who were hurting them and their friends. The King and his soldiers stopped Guy Fawkes and his friends killing a lot of people. Who is right? Well of course neither side was right. Both of them meant that a large number of people were hurt. Often when we get angry about something bad that is happening we become a little like Guy Fawkes. Instead of trying to stop the bad thing happening we just make another bad thing happen. We don't kill anybody but we do hurt them, with anary words or actions. I have a very good friend who wears a wrist band that has four letters on it WWJD. They stand for 'What Would Jesus Do and he says it helps him when he gets angry or fed up with someone. He stops and thinks 'What would Jesus do?' I think it might help us all. I wonder what Guy Fawkes would have done if he had had one?


Dear Margaret,

Le Page Ensemble * * * *

at St Nicolas Church, Kings Norton Review by Christopher Morley

One of the most glorious works in the chamber music repertoire must surely be the Second String Quartet of Borodin, full-time professor of chemistry and part-time composer - but one of such abiding appeal.

This piece fuses melodic generosity (Kismet didn't plunder it for nothing) with textural strength, and it speaks to every kind of listener. To see the smiles on the faces of Saturday's audience as the slow movement's "And this is my beloved" music unfolded was something very special.

The Le Page Ensemble allowed all this outpouring of lyricism to flow naturally, inner parts constantly alert beneath the songfulness, with a fine sense of ensemble and with a rich, warm sound in the natural acoustic of this church which could well prove a useful concert-venue.

Given in support of the important Kings Norton Restoration project, the concert also featured the Birmingham premiere of John Joubert's In Retrospect, part of the celebrations of this much-loved composer's 80th birthday year.

Beginning with a theme drawn from a work of Joubert's teenage years, and one which reveals what an eager, ravenous ear he had even then (Debussy and a Mozart melody which also inspired Max Reger immediately came to mind), the piece progresses through four variations, each dedicated to one of the composer's four grandchildren.

There is a great sense of characterisation here (though I am assured it was not deliberately so), and the final variation has seeds of Mahler Three in it, its phrases gently building towards a sense of quiet peroration.

On the 21st of September a group from Kings Norton Parish left Birmingham for a week on the island of lona off the west coast of Scotland.

We were staying in the Macleod Centre which is run by the Iona Community.

had wanted to go for some while but they do very little in the school holidays and being a teacher could not go at any other time. Now I have changed my job the opportunity was there and I jumped at it.

Travelling over to lona the first building you can make out is the Abbey and that mixed with all the excitement and apprehension that goes with visiting a new place made the ferry journey over to the island a special experience.



Once there we found we were with two other groups and then some people who had come separately. The groups were interesting as one was from Utrecht in Holland and the others were members of the Dutch Church in London. We had some really interesting conversations.

What were the worst and best things about Iona?

The worst were not bad things but really came from my expectations. First I thought we were coming to an established community, actually there were only three people who were long standing members (all of whom were truly wonderful) the others, who did most of the running of the place, were youngsters who come up for 6 weeks and nearly every night there was a new face to say hello to! I had expected to be really bowled over by the Abbey services but was not. I had expected it to give me a sense of peace and somewhere to refresh my soul but instead seemed to be constantly running from one activity to the next.

The best!... All came after I threw all my expectations away and started to allow myself to find what was there, not just what I was looking for. After spending the first few days mixing with the other quests at meal times we started to sit together and our community, the eleven of us that had travelled there together, became much stronger and I gained really close friends. Iona is stunningly beautiful and once I pushed down the guilt of not taking part in all the activities put on in the Macleod Centre and allowed the time to explore, sometimes by myself sometimes with friends, I was able to find the peace and refreshment I was looking for. Finally I accepted the services in the Abbey for what they needed to be, something accessible to all, and then there was one Eucharist taken by a young minister who was profoundly deaf. She had an incredible spiritual presence when taking a service and when she broke the bread for communion the feeling was completely indescribable but very, very powerful.

lona: a place of contrast, beauty exposed to the elements. It opens you up, lets loose your vulnerabilities and lets you find yourself. If you get the chance do what I did...jump!
