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From The Rector

"People get the clergy they pray for" - looking forward to a new member of the Team.

At last, we are able to advertise for a Team Vicar to fill the post left vacant by David when he moved last year. (Rebecca's not leaving, in case you were worried!) After long and careful discussion with the Bishop, the advert will be something like:

Community Missioner

With the Bishop for Birmingham, we are praying for a Community Missioner, with Team Vicar status, to join an established team of clergy, lay leaders and congregations who pray and work:

- to be a worshipping transforming community in Christ;
- to live out God's radical welcome for all;
- to be equipped for work in God's world.

Kings Norton Team Clergy and Readers are licensed collegially across the whole parish. Each Team member has responsibility for leadership and development of specific areas of our common work within a Team vision of commitment and accountability to God, to one another, to lay ministers and leaders and to the whole people of God. When we do this, God's mission grows. When we don't, it falters.

Specific responsibilities

To enable renewal of mission across every aspect of parish life and expression;

To develop mission and community ministry in the extensive outer estate areas of the parish and lead Team and Church involvement in Druids Heath;

To lead the Team and our congregations in areas of ministry, learning, training and service, as discerned and shared with Team colleagues and lay leaders.

The last few months have not been easy, to say the least, but we have learned so much about the real potential for new mission and growth in our parish. That is already underway – but our new colleague will make a very large difference. There is a very old saying that "people get the clergy they pray for" which asks a lot of questions I'd rather not answer – but your prayers will really matter. Jayne, Rebecca, Fay, Ruth, Donald, Jess and I - and others - know that we could not begin to manage without them. Please continue!

But a new priest in the parish ought to make us ask "What for?"

We build up our expectations of what clergy are for from all sorts of past stories and present hope.

Past clergy have a strong hold on our imagination, for good or ill.

There is an oddness too about just a few of us in church having a position which seems very different from everyone else's. And sometimes it is. In church services of

Leonard Miskin

On Friday 12th June, we gathered with Leonard's sons, David, Stephen and Andrew, his nephew, Michael, their families and many friends from Leonard's rich walk of life. Leonard's funeral was, like him, full of warmth, love and stories of the unexpected – but sadly no explosions or bonfires. Within it all, we knew his deep faith and serious purpose. Many, young and old, wept and smiled in thankfulness for his faithful friendship and his beloved Ruth as we laid his coffin with hers.

Leonard's faith in God was steeped in the Book of Common Prayer – but not because of a stubborn refusal to move out of the 16th century. He was as David said, a "Renaissance" man, gifted in his chosen field of chemical engineering – and in teaching, music, mathematics, drainage, school roofing, precision gardening – and bonfires. He caught, however, the true spirit of the Renaissance – honest enquiry, concern that words and concepts were used accurately – and above all that they served new useful and creative purpose.

His devotion to the BCP grew from its being woven into the heart of his life and faith. He knew its collects and its calendar. The psalms in their BCP version (by Coverdale not Cranmer!) were so often on his tongue. 8am Holy Communion was his meat and drink until the last year or so. But this did not close him to newer ways of worship – as long as they were new, not simply fiddling around with loved words – and had clear purpose and meaning.

His devotion to Hawkesley, our church school, since its birth in 1976, was as deep as it was long. Attention to children's work and stories, help with swimming trips - and weekly roof survey - were all generously given and cry out for others to fill his shoes. (Will you?)

By one of life's ironies, he was buried on a day which the "new" church calendar had made the Feast of St Barnabas – the "son of encouragement". Leonard would question the change - but no saint's day could be more apt for our very own Barnabas, a true friend and encourager of young and older, women and men alike. He rests in Christ's peace, alleluia.



Postal Address 277–279 Pershore Road South, Kings Morton, Birmingham B30 3EX all kinds, we are the ones who seem to set the tone, to speak on behalf all - and have the last word. To strangers or to those who are not very confident, we sometimes seem to bring a presence, again for good or ill, which others don't. And we are the ones to whom the church gives authority to bless, absolve and preside at Communion.

And it is too easy to think that we always know right from wrong, or know more than others about God or prayer or worship or the Bible.

We should know enough to give confidence that others are safe in our hands – and to encourage others to grow in faith and in just being fully alive – but that is all.

But all this can only flow from our own humanity in Christ, from not being afraid to let others see our own dependence on God's grace in all that we are and do. Without that, we have nothing to offer.

A lovely new book (called "Praying for England: Priestly Presence in Contemporary Culture" – but don't let that put you off!) has a stunning piece by Archbishop Rowan on this. Simply put, he is saying that as Jesus through the Cross has "made a space" in which complex human beings can discover their true self, loved and known by God, so clergy are entrusted with enabling the whole church to offer that same space in Christ for all. It's what a parish church is for. It's what the outreach of each congregation is for. It's what all our hospitality and welcome is for.

As we pray for our new Community Missioner, please ask for someone who lives by God's grace, who is not afraid of their own weakness and who wants to use her or his priestly gifts to make God's space for all, to offer their gifts in growing confidence without fear of competition or judgment.

Pray for that - and we will grow.


If you have any books or tombola prizes, we'd be delighted to have them delivered to Saint Nicolas Place by 10th July.

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



KINGS NORTON YOUTH FELLOWSHIP REUNION

Sunday Lunch at St Nicolas' Place on 10th May 2009 was a very special occasion for those present.

In the summer of 1949, a unique happening took place in Kings Norton, just after the installation of the Parish's new incumbent, Rev.E.G.Ashford, A Youth Club already existed but it was closed to all but Confirmed members of the Church of England. It was not particularly progressive or vibrant. It had only sparse membership and was presided over by the local Curate.

The incoming Vicar was keen to increase life - those sixty years ago. There, the Club's relevance in the area and met with three young (19 year old) lads to discuss his ideas. They proposed that the down-at-heel building. members themselves should run the Club and that it should be opened to all young people from whatever background. Ted Ashford was aggressively opposed to the idea, contending that there was no spect of its being successful. In the event, he was proved wrong, but he accepted the outcome with magnanimity and the Kings Norton Youth Fellowship was born.

By Christmas 1949, with over one hundred members, its future was secure and the Vicar and his wife accepted an invitation to join the members for a meal - in the Saracen's Head, no less!

Totally self-governing, KNYF became a catalyst for discussion, entertainment, creativity and sporting prowess in the Kings Norton area. It gave so many

young people the opportunity to socialise, organise their own affairs, display their latent talent and broaden their horizons. It prospered and flourished for over ten years and is remembered with great fondness to this

To celebrate its 60th Anniversary, past members returned, for a Reunion, to their old stomping ground. The recently restored 'Saracen's Head', smartened-up and renamed, was the venue. But it was remembered, like an old friend, the way it was - welcoming, reassuring and full of where they had stamped their not inconsiderable group personality on the

Of the over ninety people that accepted the invitation, seventy were past members. Now in their seventies (some no longer in the best of health), they travelled from all parts to meet and have a meal together.

I know of no other Youth Club. completely self-sufficient in this way, that can boast a following of seventy plus, sixty years later.

Our thanks are due to the Restoration staff, many helpers and particularly Jacqui Parsons and her team of cooks and waitresses for ensuring that the event was an unqualified success


Book Review "Why go to church?"

Timothy Radcliffe OP

Continuum Books

This is the Archbishop of Canterbury's 2009 Lent Book. It asks the big question for all who go to church - and for the many more who might like the answer to be "Don't."

Timothy Radcliffe's answer is an easy read – but not a quick one. He writes in short sentences with lots of stories – but each one is full of meaning for us to ponder – and they are very close to what all sorts of us feel. He is a Dominican friar, but one with a rich affection for people and deep understanding of what humans feel like and seek in our daily lives.



He also understands why people don't go to church and his answer is very far from "Because you should!" He knows that "church" can be difficult or boring or strange, because that's what he sometimes feels himself. He knows that church life sometimes feels so far away from what seems "normal" that it looks to have no meaning for the way we

His answer takes us through the heart of what we do in church with bread and wine in Communion - the Eucharist.

In the Eucharist, we can be taken through the crises and challenges of faith, we can be caught up in the hope that was and is Christ's on Good Friday – and formed afresh as people who are capable of love.

On the way, Timothy Radcliffe touches so many questions of faith and living - and lets us share his own struggles and his experiences of it often seeming boring and pointless. But he also lets us see the grace which he knows and feels in Eucharist and the ways it has shaped him, if sometimes falteringly, in love.

I loved it.



significant that such a considerable rise in attendance is *not* considered the most important impact of the day upon the Church congregation. Like Holy Week in Kings Norton, it is the shared task to which all are called which brings a sense of shared purpose and unity. People involved in the Back to Church event reported a much greater impact upon both Church and 'returners' when planning was meticulously implemented and passionately embraced. When commitment are intime and vested in this way, it can transform a Community, as we witnessed during Holy Week. It takes a whole community to be inspired to offer whole-hearted hospitality to strangers before those strangers can become friends.

It is hoped that the week in Kings Norton will be a vehicle with which to encourage awareness across the congregations of Kings Norton Team Parish. It will help us to see the depth and breadth of our engagement with Community. It will also increase awareness of all that Church has offer to the Communities of Kings Norton.

Benefits to people coming back to Church

Assumptions and generalisations are not helpful. However, we do know that many people have come to Church in Kings Norton because of negative and even abusive experiences of Church in the past. Offering a 'safe' experience of Church will be vital to the project.

Candlelit Church and Open Church are just two perfect examples of this kind of offering. But they are two of

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A SHORT HISTORY OF KINGS NORTON HISTORY SOCIETY

The Society grew out of an Extra-Mural Study Group led by Miss Nicklin in 1960. In 1980, a public meeting was held in Kings Norton Library and the Kings Norton History Society was formed. According to the minutes of the meeting held on Monday 6th October, 'Mesdames Watson, Hubble and Goodger (Secretary); Messrs Melling (Chairman), Russell and Chinery (Vice-Chairman and Treasurer)' were present. Subscriptions were to be '£I per year for adults and 50p for students under 18 years'. Miss Hopkins, Mr Bull and Mr Smith were invited to join the Committee. Initially, the meetings were held on the 4th Tuesday in the month in the Library. By November, 44 members had paid their subscriptions and the possibility of hiring the Co-op Hall on Pershore Road was investigated and two meetings were held there. A decision was then made hire the Saracen's Head at a cost of £6.

The Society held the first of many exhibitions in the Old Grammar School at the Church Open Day on 11 July 1981. Over the years, the Society has played a large part in drawing attention to Kings Norton's historic buildings. In 1982, it persuaded Birmingham Civic Society to put up a plaque to commemorate Thomas Hall on the Old Grammar School. Funds were raised to purchase a new signboard for the Saracen's Head, which was unveiled by Lord Kings Norton in 1986.

Members of the Society have written pamphlets on a variety of historic subjects. Stephen Price, who attended the original Study Group, has been involved with the Society from the start and we eagerly await the publication of the book on Kings Norton he is compiling with George Demidowicz. Jim Melling carried out substantial early research on Kings Norton and his lectures have always been very popular. He is also a talented artist and the Society's logo is his sketch of the North Range. In his Chairman's report 1981, Jim stated that his "early fears of apathy and lack of interest have now disappeared. Our meetings are well attended and our Society thrives . . . long may it do so."

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HISTORY OF HYMNS

"Praise my Soul, the King of Heaven" was written by the same man who wrote "Abide with me" - Henry Francis Lyte (1793-1847). It was first published in 1834 in a small book called "The Spirit of the Psalms" containing a collection of hymns by Lyte. They were not simply paraphrases, like the old metrical psalms (such as The Lord's my Shepherd - Psalm 23), but are poetical re-interpretations. Praise My Soul is a revisitation of Psalm 103, with some wonderful lines of poetry to recapture the spirit of the psalm. The original "Praise Him! Praise Him!" cry has been replaced in some hymnals by Alleluias and verse 4 is, sadly, usually omitted now. Have a read of it now - as you may never have met it before - and re-read Psalm 103 again too. The hymn is usually sung to a tune of the same name by John Goss (1800-1880).
