



- Changes at Hawkesley School
- Response to the Diocesan Transforming Church initiative

We also caught up with the parish's financial situation and the Back to Church initiative. (I'll be writing soon to all church members on these.)

Lam more and more convinced that all these things cannot be separated and that they are all part of a re-visioning of what we are all about as a Team Ministry in Kings Norton. Since the Team Ministry began in 1974, so much has been achieved but most work and energy has been given to the separate parts of the

t the Extra Parish General Team: much less to what we are together. At best, this has led to at Church Council on 16th some stunning initiatives and many lower key but worthwhile endeavours. But it has also, at times, created friction, uncertainty and the placing of "our" part above that of others. This has led to times of great occasional despair.

> We have long felt that we must "do something" about x, y or z, whether it be young people, mission, care of St Nicolas and churchyard, estate ministry, support for unemployed people, prayer groups etc. The list of what we "ought to do something about" gets ever longer. So does the frustration.

I think that it is time to return to the heart of what are together, in which all the separate parts are mutually encouraged and sustained not just for themselves but as part of the whole.

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# **Diocesan Synod**

Three times a year, Diocesan Synod meets. Representatives from every Church of England deanery, including Kings Norton, meet to decide on large matters and to hear reports.

We last met on July 15<sup>th</sup>. Part of the business was to agree the diocesan budget for 2010 which includes the total of Common Fund to meet clergy pay and central costs which is shared between all the parishes. It will be over £5 million, all contributed by people like us.

We also heard two stunning presentations. The first was from Barbara Hayes, the leader of Churches Industrial Group Birmingham, on church response to the economic crisis. This has hit the West Midlands even harder than most — because we make things rather than do strange things with money. The second was from Chris Boyle who has just returned from eight years as Bishop of Northern Malawi.

Both presentations were detailed, resourceful, challenging and full of God's down-to-earth wisdom. They faced up to hard, real issues and gave sound practical response. Through them both was the conviction that whether facing the challenges of rural poverty, education, health care and the effects of HIV/AIDS in Malawi or local issues of worklessness and business pressure, this is God's world in which human need and dignity must be served in God's grace. The Gospel

is not just a spiritual matter of personal salvation. The church's life and work must, in God's strength, make a difference to us all in the here and now. If it doesn't, "Thy Kingdom Come" is emptied of its fullest meaning.

But if we focus only on the here and now, we quickly lose the vision, grace and depth which God wills and wants for all – the eternal values of heaven in which we may all find the place given us in the death and rising of Jesus.

During August, the main Sunday Gospel readings take us through Chapter 6 of John's Gospel. (Do read it!) It begins with lesus feeding thousands with bread and fish. It then leads into a wonderfully complex story of chasing around the lake in boats, to lesus's declaration that "I am the Bread of Life" and to Peter's question, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life." As we follow this chapter in church, please pray that we as the church make corporate response to real human need, others' and ours. And please pray that we are renewed in the reality that God's will and promise is to feed humanity through his church, in the things of this life and of the life to come. They are in Christ as one.

**Immanuel**: a place of alternative ways of doing things in local community worship and mission.

**Hawkesley:** a church and church school which is a light and haven at the heart of deprivation and despair.

"The first task of a mission-shaped church is to ask how it can serve and be a blessing to its local community." (Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Reading) This is our calling and our first task, in which we all find our true place in God. Unless we do, we have nothing to offer the wider parish, be it Druids Heath, Pool Farm, Chaddesley, Rednal Road or anywhere else.

In this, the distinctive gifts of Hawkesley and Immanuel are vital and will be sustained, but I believe that our first focus must now be St Nicolas - as a place of shelter, gathering and prayer still known and used throughout the parish.

The Parish Review already tells us how much happens in and depends on St Nicolas. We need to ensure that we do it well and warmly.

We have work to do on building maintenance and re-ordering highlighted by the Architect's Inspection Report and the need to renew the nave platform.

Funerals, baptisms and marriages are

increasing again – but in a climate where old understandings have gone out of the window and there are profound complexities of story, grief and hope in which St Nicolas Church building grows even more as an open door to God.

We have so far failed to attract <u>any</u> interest in the new Team Vicar post – and I wonder if God is saying "Build up what you are already doing" more than "Start something wholly new." Should we re-shape this post?

The proposed changes for Hawkesley School need the commitment of the whole parish, not just Hawkesley Church members.


"Transforming Church" In different ways – and often using very different language and methods - we are already covering much of the diocese's Transforming Church agenda. We need to say this clearly and not be distracted from the calling and task we already have.

Will you pray over all these things? During August and September, we shall be offering a short course, intended for everyone, to help us all grasp what we need to do together to ensure that God's grace in Christ is, through the working of the Holy Spirit, available through his church to more and more.

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# **BOOK REVIEW**



The Shack by William P Young ISBN: 9780340979495 Pub: Hodder & Stoughton

ince it was first published in 2007, this novel has sold nearly 5 million copies. It's a gripping read and so different from other Christian novels in which the main charmed, victorious lives.

In this book, the author confronts evil in all its ugliness – the abduction and brutal murder of a 5 year old child. The story is set some four years later, when the father of the child receives a note in his post signed by and cry in the course of *The Shack*. 'Papa', his wife's name for God. The Randal's book is a great way into note invites Mack to spend a weekend with Papa at the Shack the place of Missy's murder. Mack accepts the invitation and the story unfolds, as Mack is forced to confront his feelings through a series of encounters with four main characters, Papa, Jesus, Sarayu and Sophia. The genius of the book, however, is that in encountering these characters, the reader is also forced to take a long hard look at his/her own conceptions of God as Father, as Trinity, as Creator of all (good and bad) and ultimately as

the one through whom all creation will be renewed.


Randal Rauser, a Canadian professor of theology, received so many enquiries from students and pastors regarding the book that he decided to write a theologian's response to The Shack. In Finding characters seem to live God in the Shack, he explores in more depth the theological issues raised in the novel, namely, The Trinity, The hierarchy of the Trinity, Evil, Hope in the midst of pain and the Redemption of Creation.

> Both books are easy reads and not very long, but be prepared to laugh theology, drawing as it does on the scenes and conversations that take place within the Shack.

I thoroughly enjoyed reading both books and am still unpacking in my own mind the topics raised.

PS. I think Papa is wonderfully unexpected and full of surprises!

So, what's new?

**Logo**: We shall have a new parish logo, based on the cross from the green altar frontal in St Nicolas, which was made by church members. We shall use it for all parish stationery from September. # Review of magazine, newsletter, etc and readership

We are going to make the **weekly** newsletter simpler. It will be a single A4 sheet with worship information for the Sunday, prayer needs for all and brief diary of the forthcoming week.

The magazine has a large readership. Many are valued friends who may not want to be regular church attenders. We need to think about our magazine becoming more a church-centred magazine for friends in the wider community, rather than the main communication for actual church members.

And we also need a new simple monthly "church bulletin" with essential information for all who feel that they are members of our congregations, with a sure way of getting it into the hands of all who wanted, whether or not they were in church each week. It would contain a diary of events for the forthcoming 4-6 weeks, long term dates and information and summaries of main matters for the prayer and action of all

# Food, Friendship and Fun

t the Kings Norton Festival, in many diverse people were consulted about what would bring them to Church. Food, friendship and fun were three things people were keen to find. Sharing food with friends is a clear priority for Jesus. People also felt a need for music and for laughter.

The promise of food, friendship and fun with music and laughter is something which would encourage some to come to Church and some to stay.

Back to Church Week is encouraging people to celebrate those areas of life which already offer these things. In our community, we offer friendship, food, music, laughter and fun to one another as gifts from God. This doesn't mean we all have to have 'fun' and be 'happy'. It means that we can find these things in the bleakest moments of life and not be alone in our despair as much as it means sharing joy.

Our weekly diary will serve as a template for Back to Church Week. There will be no fireworks or wildly exciting new events which cannot realistically be sustained throughout the year. Instead, we will be incorporating many different ways to make our usual Church week accessible. This simple idea is to show people what we are doing and to invite them to join in. It is the Gospel imperative to "Come and See". What we do every week is what really matters, and for this week we are inviting friends and strangers to "Come and See" what God is doing in this Parish in food, friendship, fun, laughter and music. We are celebrating the various ways in which our

interconnectedness brings us wholeness.

This is what Back to Church Week will offer:

- 'Freshers' Fair'
- 'Skills Exchange'
- 'Bring a Friend'
- 'Photo Exhibition'

### 'Freshers' Fair'

Universities have a week at the beginning of term where all the societies, clubs and political parties take an opportunity to introduce new people to what they do and invite new recruits. Imagine the Kings Norton Festival or a Fete or Farmers' Market. We will be doing something similar during this week in September. Stalls are laid out but instead of selling food or gifts or crafts we will be selling Church and all that we do, inviting new recruits and explaining the value of what we are and what we do. For example, the Hawkesley School and Hawkesley Church, Immanuel, Women's Fellowship, the Churchyard Carers and Knit and Natter may all have stalls with representatives of their group, photographs or examples of their work. People can come and ask about what they do and how they can become involved. ello everyone! My name is Gail and I am going to talk with you about Prayer. In the Bible it talks a lot about Prayer. Jesus very often went off to pray, so it is something that we too should be doing.

# Prayer simply means 'talking with God'.

It is a special way we have been given to communicate with God. God loves us so much that he wants us to spend time with him, talking to him about what's been happening in our lives, whether it is good or bad.

We can pray at anytime and anywhere and God always listens to us when we pray.

You don't have to worry about what words you say either. In fact, God prefers us to keep our prayers simple and not use fancy words. Speak to him as you would a friend - after all, God is the most special friend you will ever have.

Prayer has a lot of power. God can do anything. Because of this, there are things we should try to include in our prayers -

We should praise God - God is good and he deserves to hear our thanks and praise.

We should thank him for all he does and provides in our lives.

An important part of prayer is asking forgiveness for all our mistakes. God will always forgive us when we are sorry.

We need to pray for others and for ourselves.

# Taizé: Discovering Joy in Simplicity

f you were asked to point to evidence that Christian faith is alive, well and attracting young people by the tens of thousands. I wonder where you would start? If radio, TV and the press are your only sources of news, your search would, I suspect, be a long one. Our media have chosen our priorities for us and highlighting a healthy in which to listen. Words are used interest in Christianity, particularly amongst the young, is not one of them. I am guessing, of course, but I suspect that the number of church congregations in Britain where young people are in the majority is on the small side. Like it or not, the prevailing impression is that few under-50s "take religion seriously" these days.

That is why it is so utterly surprising that, just a day's drive from Kings Norton, there is a church with capacity for thousands which, at those times of the year when people are free to travel, is full to bursting three times a day. Even more astonishingly, it is a church in which you will never hear a sermon, see a drum kit or watch a multi-media presentation. As a first-time visitor, sitting on the floor in the half-light, surrounded by a sea of expectant faces, waiting in silence for a service to begin, you might fall to wondering what it is that brings them here in such numbers. A charismatic preacher, perhaps? The latest worship songs performed by a talented band? An emotionally-charged atmosphere?

This is the next surprise. The tens of thousands of visitors, most of them

young adults, who come from all over the world each year to spend a week with the Taizé Community in France are drawn there by experiences radically different from what contemporary culture offers. In worship, the singing of beautiful, repetitive chants; short, accessible readings; and silence, lots of it sparingly. Candles, icons, time to think and, at the heart of it all, a community of monks with whom to pray and sing. And between services, opportunities to meet in small international groups to talk and share experiences; short, accessible talks given by one of the brothers; shared meals with strangers who quickly become friends; and, of course, long walks in the beautiful rolling Burgundian

What surprises newcomers of any age, and what radically changed my own understanding of faith on the first of many visits in 1979, is the beauty of the worship. Brother Roger, who founded Taizé in the 1940s, wrote of his desire to create "a community where kindness of heart and simplicity would be at the centre of everything." Those principles are reflected in every aspect of life at Taizé. Brother Roger believed that churches should be places of few words: the important thing is to listen to God. Prayer ceases to be a monologue and becomes instead an inward expression of simple trust in Christ, who reveals himself to us through the Gospels. I have come to think of it as something like sunbathing, a joyful, wordless resting in the healing, life-giving presence of God.

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mmanuel Church recently had our weekend away at the Pioneer Centre near Bewdley. About twenty people stayed for the whole weekend.

We started on the Friday evening with some informal worship, then stayed up chatting the night away.

On the Saturday morning, Deb and Sian put us through our paces leading us on discussions and proposals about Immanuel Church and all that it entails. It was lovely that some more of our congregation joined us for these important discussions. We got into discussion groups and had to come up with a solid proposal for different categories about themes picked up from the questionnaire previously completed by each member of the congregation. Whilst the adults were hard at work, the children were being thoroughly entertained by Jon, David and Nathan with many different balls games as well as an 'inflatable activity' called BIG BOUNCE. We ended our afternoon off with an all age rounders game, football and running races. In the evening we all went to

watch those brave enough to take on the Zip Wire. All harnessed up Georgie, Steph, Karl, Akheem, Nathan, Alan and Kai took the ladder up to the platform ready to zip down the wire! It was extremely entertaining for those of us keeping our feet firmly on the ground!

On the Sunday we had a lovely informal service, led by Jayne, where the children got involved in Lego building



(well the adults too) and some songs that had some actions.

All participants from churches across the diocese met at the Cathedral in September for an opening service of worship and to thank God for bringing us to this point in our lives.

The course covered all the topics I had been so hungry for and was divided into three parts. We looked at major events in the Old Testament; Jesus' life and ministry in the gospels; Church membership - calling and living.

For me, the course was thoroughly enjoyable, exciting and rewarding, working alongside people I very soon felt comfortable with and fond of, led sensitively whereby all contributions were valued.

Our particular group ranged in age from 17 to 70s, which made responses in discussion interesting and refreshing. I found comfort in the depth of faith in our youngest person, balanced by the quiet strength, commitment and trust of years of the eldest in our group. Not only have

year ago, I was searching for ways to develop and build upon my understanding of my. Christian calling and to further I gained the knowledge I hoped for when I set out on 3D, but also a deeper awareness of how God is active in the lives of others (and myself).

As I sat in the cathedral at the closing act of worship alongside everyone else with whom I had begun this 3D journey, words from Ecclesiastes 3 sprang to mind, as they had done ever since I contemplated joining the course:

"There is a time for everything, and a season for everything under heaven...a time to plant and a time to build..."
Words which speak to me especially.

3D has been a positive and wonderful experience for me, well worth my efforts and I am thankful to those who encouraged me to join and to those who run the course. I would definitely encourage others to try it. I've had a taste and now I'm looking to do something else!

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

# From Birmingham to Blantyre and Beyond

hirteen young people aged from 15-20 from across the Diocese of Birmingham have been raising a thousand pounds each to fund a once in a lifetime trip to the twin Dioceses of Malawi.

The Malawi Youth Encounter marks the "International Year of the Child" and will give the young people, who come from across Birmingham, for an understanding of culture and life for children and young people in Malawi through a hands-on programme that includes tea picking, fishing and life in an urban environment.

They will begin their visit by staying at Zoa Tea Estate in southern Malawi. While there they will work alongside local workers: picking tea and coffee, drying fruit, fishing for Chambo and visiting the clinic and training centre. Most afternoons will be spent in Mwaya, a village on the Estate, where they will meet and interact with children and young people through games and craft activities.

In their second week they will travel to Blantyre, Malawi's second city, where they will meet and talk to Christian young people from around the Southern Diocese. Through conversations and interaction young people from Birmingham Diocese will be able to compare their involvement in church life and future

leadership with that of their peers in Malawi.

The experience will finish with a visit to Lake Malawi and Liwonde National Park. The young people have all raised £1,000 to go on the trip and are very excited about the project. They travel to Malawi from July 24th. Initiatives to raise the funds range from a formal dinner in a Birmingham hotel to head shaves, bike rides, cake sales, bell ringing peals and quiz nights.

The trip was be launched on Thursday July 16th at Birmingham Cathedral. The young people will have a Chichewa lesson from the Acting Dean of the Cathedral, Peter Howell-Jones and learn to tie a chitende - the Traditional cloth worn in Malawi. They will have a final briefing about the trip and commissioning from the Acting Dean. There will be a chance to talk to the young people as well as the Bishop's Adviser for Youth Ministry, Helen Tomblin, who has organised the trip.

Helen Tomblin said: "We hope this trip will be life-changing for the young people from Birmingham as well as for those they meet in Malawi. The city and the Diocese of Birmingham have had a long relationship with Malawi and we hope this trip will build on those 40 years of friendship.
