He wrote both these poems to provide procession hymns for the solemn ceremony at which relics of the Holy Cross (Some information taken from Frank were presented to a new convent near Poitiers in late AD 569. Dr J. M. Neale (1818-1866) created the transla-

tions of the texts that we know today along with many other ancient hymns he rescued from obscurity.



"SING MY TONGUE THE GLORIOUS BATTLE"

his ancient hymn was written by Venantius Fortunatus somewhere in the 6th Century and brought back into usage by the prolific researcher and translator J. M. Neale in the mid 19th century.

The words can be found at A&M(NS) 59 or HON 602 and it never ceases to amaze me that hymns written so long ago, and in another language, can still be so relevant to our faith today: a small reminder that Christ really IS for all times.

The hymn takes its background from another by the same writer - "The Royal Banners Go" [at A&M (NS) 58; HON 663]. They both take a triumphalistic view of the Cross and then encourage us to meditate on the physical nature of Christ's suffering on the Cross. The Davidic prophesy mentioned in The Royal Banners is based on an incorrect translation of part of Psalm 96, happened upon it and beneath it – and which, in some medieval psalters said "Tell it out among the nations, that the Lord is Reigning from a tree", rather than "...that the Lord is King". From this mistranslation came a deep meditation on the Cross and sion......Makes you think about how God can make even our mistakes into something worthwhile!

es respectively) with a final doxology. The first half celebrates that the battle is over and that Christ has won redemption for all humankind. The Victim has become Victor. It takes the events of Good Friday and turns them into a meditation for us. The second part dwells specifically on the Cross itself - and was written at a time when all physical "things of faith" were highly venerated - to own or even touch a portion of the true cross would have felt like being in direct contact with God for the medieval Christian pilgrim. Most churches of any "worth" (in human terms) held at least some small reliquary of a saint, and the more influential a church, the bigger the reliquary or the more "important" the saintso a piece of the Cross would have ranked very, very high in these circumstances. The next best thing to touching it, our seeing it, would have been to reflect deeply upon the Cross and all that here we are given the text to do just

We usually sing the words to Pange Lingua [pron. Pan-day ling-u-a] - a plainsong melody which has probably supported the words for most if not all of its life as a hymn. "The Royal Banners" also has a plainsong melody called Vexilla Regis, but we sometimes There were originally 10 stanzas of "Sing use a 20th Century tune called Gonfalon Royal by P. C. Buck for this hymn.

Where were you born?

In Sutton Coldfield. I lived with my family until I was 18. I am the Middle Child (with its syndrome!), having an older sister and a younger brother.

What is your occupation?

I was a Community and Youth Worker for 15 years. At 18 years old, I went to work with British Youth For Christ. This meant working for one year in Bolton, Lancashire, in a team of four people running youth projects - a drop-in centre for the long-term unemployed, schools work, detached work and supporting a church youth group. After my year there, I moved with YFC to Tamworth where I developed youth projects in a community important to you? centre as well as church and schools work. After 3 years, I decided to work for My parents took us to church from when a qualification in Community and Youth Work so came to Westhill College, Selly Oak, where I completed my Degree (Bachelor of Philosophy in Education no

less!!) whilst working in several youth and community settings. I continued to work in this profession until 7 years ago when I left work to have Sam. My last job was with Cornerstone Christian Charity as a Project Worker overseeing their community work across the Midlands, such as toddler groups, parenting courses, after school clubs, youth work, holidays for single parent families and staff training. I'm a full time parent now to Sam (7), Katie (2) and Ruth (1) and I love it! I'm actively involved at Fairway Primary School as a Governor and parent and I'm also involved in Parish life!

Why Kings Norton?

I moved to Kings Norton in 1992 to be closer to my college course in Selly Oak. I was asked to help set up "SPLITS" (the forerunner to Impact!) youth project. Through this I came into contact with Immanuel Church and stayed. I then met Alan at Immanuel, was wooed and married and we are happily settled here. All my family still live in and around Birmingham and I like to be near to them.

Why is your Christian faith

My faith has always been a big part of me. we were tiny. Dad was the church organist, Mum the Sunday School Superintendant. I was always aware of God's presence and care for me. At

Enriching Discipleship and Leadership - John

I see this role as being the very exciting one of working with others to help and encourage the whole people of God in this place to live out the implications of our bapbaptism, we are called by God to follow Christ, to grow in him, and, in our service of God and of our neighbour, to shine as lights in the world. My role includes:

- ensuring opportunities for young and old (in years and faith) to be nurtured and to develop in their faith and understanding, and to become confident disciples of Christ in the world.
- leading the discernment, development and deployment of the gifts of God's peo-

The practical outworking of these includes:

- Identifying both the gifts and the training needs, of both individuals and congregations.
- Overseeing the development of a coherent parish programme of short courses for Christian learning, including opportunities for us all to grow in our faith and understanding, and to reflect on the ways in which our faith can be lived out in our homes, places of work and communities.
- Ensuring the provision of suitable training for people called to particular roles and responsibilities inside and outside the church. I would expect by the summer to have drafted a 12 month programme of courses, to take effect from September 2010.
- Having a key role in working with individuals to help in the discernment of vocations to particular forms of ministry.
- Ensuring that the varied gifts of team colleagues are fully used.

Enriching Relationships and Outreach - Jayne

Much already goes on to make this happen, through the welcoming that we do on Sundays, on Wednesdays, on Thursdays; through the introduction to church, baptism and marriage sessions; through the baptism and funeral follow up; through outward giving; through home communions and through the monthly parish healing service. We now need to help those who are already a part of these, to appreciate how their little bit feeds the bigger picture and thus makes them a vital part of this bigger picture and draws others in. Some immediate (or at least under way by September 2010) practical things that could happen are:

s I write this. 
Over and over again, we encounter Bruce crying out in despair - "Lord, I don't know how to do this - just make me a puppet on your string!" And finding that his Lord

AFGHANISTAN AND ITS PEOPLE

this country which we hear and see so much about in the media? The following may be of some interest, especially to anyone who receives the newsletters from our CMS prayer partners, Grace and Pete How.

Afghanistan has been, and still is, at the cross roads of East and West for centuries and remains the scene of conflict between many cultures and tribes. Its 28 million Muslim population is made up of many tribes, chief of which are Pashtun (42%), Tajik (27%) and Hazara and Uzbek (both 9%). As a result, taking up of arms to settle disputes is widespread and there is no history of strong representative or centralized government; instead, loyalty organisation to local family tribes prevails, rather than to a distant centralized government.

While the Taliban held power, they favoured the majority Pashtuns, while the minority Hazaris, mostly Shia followers, were the target for persecution. You may have read 'The Kite Runner', or seen the film, which illustrates this ethnic prejudice very well. Apparently, the producer of the film was a Hazari, who when he first heard the verse from Matthew chapter 5, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you," thought that it was impossible on account of the 237281 or email angela@feba.org.uk inter-tribal hatred, but has since discovered that hate can never be beaten by hate.

hat do we know about The main national language is Dari and is one of the few unifying factors in this divided country, for at least 50% of the people speak it. Because the literacy rate is so low, newspapers and periodicals only reach a small proportion, but short wave radio is popular and especially valued and used by the minority Christian community, which is not free to worship or share faith openly. Although there is no visible church in Afghanistan, believers meet regularly in people's homes, but sadly those who could record Christian programmes on account of their suitable voices may not be willing to take the risk of being involved for fear of retribution.

> FEBA is a Christian specialising in broadcasting in Asia and because programmes cannot



be made safely within the country, they are recorded by Afghans who work with its partners in North America, Europe and Australia. These teams work together to fund and develop programmes which address ethnic and cultural differences for the many different groups.


