From The Rector We ask so often, "Who is in? Who is out? How do we know?"

I heard a story the other day about an Australian sheep farmer visiting Wales. He was fascinated by the dry stone walls and by the care and skill put into making and repairing them. "But why do you bother?" he asked. "All that happens is that the sheep gather at the wall, trample the ground and turn it into a bog when it's wet and bare hard earth when it's not." His puzzled hosts asked, "If you don't have walls, how do you keep your sheep in?" "We don't," he replied. "We just dig a borehole, up comes the water and they keep on coming."

Steve Chalke, a lively Baptist minister, told the story at a church mission conference - in Wales, no less. His point was simple. Churches keep worrying about walls, fences, differences, boundaries – between each other and between those who do not look for God in church life and those who do. We ask so often, "Who is in? Who is out? How do we know?" And so much of that worrying is a complete and often hurtful waste of time.

Jesus kept talking of God's living water, of himself and his people being a spring of life to refresh and renew and to quench the thirst of spirit and heart. If we're worried about the future of ourselves and the church, we need to listen to the story. "Just dig a borehole, up comes the water and they keep on coming." How might the church be that spring and be less anxious about walls?

"Open the doors and people will come in," says Maggie Durran, a writer on church development who visited us in January. And it is true. On Wednesday and Saturday mornings and on Wednesday and Thursday evenings, St Nicolas is open – and people come in, as they do when we open at other times. Hawkesley and Immanuel have discovered the same. This too is at the heart of the Restoration Project – and our new work on Druids Heath.

When we asked Graeme Dobson, the new Head of Hawkesley School, how he saw the role of the school and the church in their community, he said, "To be together a safe haven and a beacon of light for everyone."

As long as we trust more in God's promises of peace and welcome than in any walls we put up, we will be that haven and light – and so open new springs of God's living water - sometimes a bit muddy, sometimes rushing in torrents, sometimes slow and steady, but always drawing in more as we drink.





KINGS NORTON FESTIVAL A fun day for Everyone Saturday 14h July - 10 till 2 p.m. Saracens Head and St Nicolas Churchyard



Despite less space than usual, as we are unable to use the Old Grammar School, Saracen's Head and hard standing in front of the building, the Festival will be bigger and more varied than ever before. At the time of going to press we have 35 stalls in the church grounds and 15 inside the building.

The Restoration Volunteers will be selling programmes and raffle tickets and manning a merchandise stall, and offering opportunities to sponsor a beam in either building or a decade of history from 1492 to the present day. Calendars with photos of the restoration archaeological discoveries will be on sale, along with Christmas cards!

Local community groups will be well represented. 

General Synod meets at York University Friday, July 5th to Tuesday, July 10th

Presidential Address by the Archbishop of York.

Major items of concern to the Church's mission and ministry. the Church's wider relations and the Church's engagement with society will be discussed at the General Synod when it meets at York University from Friday, July 5, to Tuesday, July 10. There is also an emphasis on the Church's resources. including items on clergy pensions and on the Church Commissioners. There are several special addresses and presentations, including an address by Sir Albert Aynsley-Green, the Children's Commissioner. and Presidential Address by the Archbishop of York.

A Taste of Indonesia

Life for so many people in Indonesia is life on the edge, and perhaps nowhere more so than Medan in northern Sumatera. I used to go backwards and forwards to the college in a Betchak - a cycle rickshaw. It was a terrifying journey - rather like riding in a baby buggy down the fast lane of the motorway! The dual carriageway was stretched to 6 or 8 lanes as traffic competed with each other to be first in the inevitable queue ahead, huge lorries thundering towards us, powerful motorbikes swerving between them as my driver took his chance to cross all the traffic to the lane down to the house.

I found out the first year that he is a Christian, an elder of his mainly Nias Island congregation church. He was pleasant, polite, reliable, protective and picked up some English very quickly - far faster than I picked up any Indonesian! I was particularly glad to see his smile at the end of a long day, especially when we had one of the many daily ferocious tropical storms. When I returned the second year we found out that much of his route had now been taken over by the local minibus service and his trade had been halved. My contract with him meant that his children could continue at school and he was able to pay his rent for another year - a humbling thought.

Meanwhile, at the college, STT. Abdi Sabda (Servant of the Word) the new Principal is pursuing Christian contacts in North America for assistance to upgrade the campus and the library in particular. Gone were the wandering hens and chicks - bird flu is now rife in Jakarta - and the grounds are tended, flower beds of colourful tropical flowers and plants interspersing the palm trees. Now there are covered seated areas where students can meet up and even occasionally study! The biggest challenge has been the library. It was tiny, hot and generally ill-equipped. It has been extended, with large windows and a reading room - trouble is, they now need many more books! They are also trying to fund some scholarships for the most needy students. One of the senior lecturers has a great love and burden for blind students. He wants to see better facilities and the employment of staff with impaired sight too, to show the love of God to all. One blind student got top marks in his viva voce exams.

I met some of my first year students on my return. They greeted me so warmly and with such affection and with a rendition of 'Old McDonald has a Farm'! Of all the things I did with them this seems to have stuck in their minds the most! Well, it was great fun as the afternoon heat and humidity wore out us of all, the sun blazing down on the corrugated roofs, as we competed with the amplified call to prayer at the many local mosques and just before the next lot of storms and powerouts.

So many things to pray for - 'my' betchak man and his family, students as they prepare for their summer church placements, new students about to embark on the intensive English course and then 6 or 7 years of study - and the graduating students about to be ordained into Christian ministry.

1st July 2007 NO SMOKING So how does this affect churches?

From 1 July 2007 virtually all enclosed public places and workplaces in England will become smokefree.

So how does this affect churches?

The new smokefree law will apply to virtually all 'enclosed' and 'substantially enclosed' public places and workplaces. This includes both permanent structures and temporary ones such as tents and marquees, and includes churches, places of worship and church/parish halls. The new law also requires certain types of vehicles used for work (including voluntary work) to be smokefree, but not vehicles that are primarily for private use.

From 1 July, those people who control or manage smokefree premises and smokefree vehicles will have legal responsibilities to prevent people from smoking. The new law will require no smoking signs to be displayed in all smokefree premises and vehicles.

What sort of signs do we need?

No-smoking signs that are required to be displayed must meet the following minimum requirements:

- be a minimum of A5 in area (210mm x 148mm)
- display the international no-smoking symbol at least 70mm in diameter*
- carry the following words in characters that can be easily read: No smoking. It is against the law to smoke in these premises

Where should the signs be displayed?

The new law says that signs 'need to be displayed in a prominent position at every entrance to smokefree premises'. It does not stipulate the precise location (such as on the door), in order to afford maximum flexibility for signs to be displayed in the most appropriate place in the premises. In churches, doors which are not in use could arguably not be entrances for use by persons. It will be up to each church body (e.g., select vestry/parochial church council) to choose the most appropriate place in the building for the sign, as long as the sign is prominently displayed. It is not necessary for it to be permanently fixed to the fabric of the building. It may be that the sign could be displayed within a porch at the front of the church or on a notice board which is near the main entrance. If you have any questions about the new law (for example, you are unsure about where a sign should be positioned), we recommend you consult



your environmental health officer at your local council (who will be responsible for compliance) for further information.

The international no-smoking symbol consists of a graphic representation of a single burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle of at least 70mm in diameter with a red bar across it.

In addition, smaller signs consisting of the international no smoking symbol only (at least 70mm in diameter) must be displayed at external entrances to smokefree premises that are only used by members of staff (e.g., vestry) – providing the premises displays at least one A5 area sign.

Do we have to pay for these signs?

No. Free no-smoking signs can be downloaded and printed or, for a limited time, ordered from

smokefreeengland.co.uk/resources or calling 0800 169 1697. Churches can also display personalised signs by changing the words 'these premises' to refer to the name or type of premises – such as 'this church', 'this hall' etc, as long as the sign meets the minimum requirements set out in the new law.

Why is this necessary?

The signs will make it clear which premises and vehicles are smokefree and will demonstrate that the church authorities are taking the necessary steps to meet the requirements of the new law. They also provide some degree of legal protection for the church authorities in the unlikely event of someone being caught smoking on church premises.

BOOK REVIEW Clergy: The Origin of the Species



In 205 fascinating pages Martyn explains why clergy are as they are, where they came from, what shapes them and where things may be aoina. He seems to attack his subject with all delight the of

somebody pulling legs of a spider! Here is a book for all those who have ever wanted to ask why in puzzlement about how what and who shapes or has shaped clergy into what who and why we may be!

Martyn is without doubt a fast rising star in the firmament of the Church of England. He is Principal of Ripon College, Cuddesdon, Oxford and I can honestly say that from the moment he appeared in the environment that was Cranmer Hall Durham where I trained for ordination he stood out as one with enormous potential. His production of books is prodigious, his energy clearly huge and his writing, yes, is readable!

Here in this book Martyn attempts to take seriously the role of environment and the contextual in the shaping of ecclesial and theological development, what he calls theological realism. What are the clergy for, what defines them? How do different denominations respond to this challenge? In the light of the marginalisation of what was formerly given what does the future hold?

In the concluding section on ministry important questions are asked about the assumptions that underlay and inform ministerial identity such as basing that on biblical characters, what Martyn calls biblical functionalism. Do we instead turn to some sort of mystical piety that only ends up being difficult to address with any kind of concrete analysis, perhaps that is the reason. Finally, do we turn to the huge management of business and its models and theories.

If God makes Christ real in time and culture, in the evolving understanding of revelation and humanity then perhaps ministry is bound up in the temporal and the eternal and ministers, we, should pause before thinking that one of the above particular models can be grasped as an easy answer.

Perhaps finally we should reflect on the story of the worlds only freshwater seals in Lake Baikal, south east Siberia. Seals that were once salt water seals but became separated from the sea and adapted to their new environment. Have clergy become detached from their cultural context? Have they become lost is some cut off gene pool?

A must for clergy and those considering ordination. Perhaps for others it would prove a fascinating book that would inform some critical reflection on the role of clergy today in Kings Norton from which we would all benefit!

The Project for the Renewal of Druids Heath (PRODH)


