

From The Rector **CLIMATE OR WEATHER?**

A different Christmas. Snow really had fallen, snow on snow. The earth was hard as iron. Bits of the canal did have water like a stone. And bugs were rife.

We managed, thanks to grace and to determined acts of clearing and caring – and had the delight in mid-January of a sunny Sunday when, ice and bug free at last, most of us could gather in church.

Many were isolated, hurt and at risk, but good neighbours, extra layers, careful shopping and shovels got most of us through.

climate is different. Weather comes and goes. Climate changes much more enterprise. slowly. Weather, like life, can change day by day. It can cause emergencies and sudden change – but how we get through depends on how we have prepared for changing climate.

Genesis 41 tells the story of loseph making sure that in seven years of plenty the people of Egypt gathered enough to ensure that they had bread for all in seven years of famine. The Gospels keep bringing us back to God's gift of inner change so that we and the church can grow in love and life for every climate, not just endure changes in weather.

The horrors of the Haiti earthquake were made far worse by centuries of exploitation, violence, deforestation and debt repayment. Unlike most other sudden disaster areas, there is no underlying structure of public order, medical care, transport, education and good government. Without these, tragedy turns to a nightmare, in which only selfless action, including ours, can bring relief.

Much nearer home ,the sale of Cadbury's - and the risk to local jobs and life - is caused by a climate in which those who treat God's creation only as a place to make a fast buck We could deal with the weather - but can walk all over those who earn their living by honest work and real

> In church life too, we have grown used to managing changes in the weather as day to day events unfold. But it is the underlying climate we must now address in Lent and beyond. It is God's climate of prayer, commitment and growth in faith and love together in Christ which will make the real lasting difference, in Kings Norton and much more widely. This must be our concern this Lent.

Please join us.

Hold Thou Thy cross before my closing eyes; Shine through the gloom and point me to the skies. Heaven's morning breaks, and earth's vain shadows flee: In life, in death, O Lord, abide with me.

HISTORY OF HYMNS

Abide with me Words: Henry F. Lyte, 1847/Music: William H. Monk, 1861

My first meeting of "Abide with me" was at an evensong as a young chorister of about 13. I'd not met it at school as it was deemed "too adult". A choir mate and I commented that we liked it after we'd finished the service, though we couldn't really put into words why. We realised it wasn't really about the natural evening, but



more about the end of life, although we were singing it as an evening hymn.

I was reminded of this first meeting a few weeks ago, when I met verses 3-5 for the first time at a funeral I was playing for. Yes, the verses are all very much "of their period" in phraseology, but that "I will always abide with you" certainty is still so clear. It doesn't tell of a faith and a God that are great when everything is going well and to plan; but it talks instead of a God who is there through both "cloud and sunshine" and doesn't melt away when it all goes pear-shaped.

Henry Lyte wrote it when he was dying of TB, still only in his mid 50's. He based it on the story in Luke 24 (vv 13 -35) where the traveller is asked to "abide with us" for the night and he made it his own prayer.

I have found that it grows, rather than diminishes, in meaning as time goes on and as life gathers more dents and bruises. Re-read the hymn and the Luke passage now – with fresh eyes.


Saturday 6th February, 10am – 12 noon in St Nicolas

Where were you born?

I was born in Redcar, Cleveland, being one of eighteen: fourteen girls and four boys. I am six from the youngest and when I was only a few weeks' old, the whole family was evacuated to Wensleydale, Yorkshire, where we were made tenants on Lord Bolton's and given a farm to work. Here I spent the first ten years of my childhood before moving to Lincolnshire. Then, when I left school at fifteen, I went to work in service in Long Eaton in Nottingham. I met my late husband when I was twenty one who was in the Royal Navy. We lived in Plymouth for a few months before travelling to South Africa on board a ship which took us six weeks. From there we travelled to quite a few countries.

What was your occupation?

My first occupation was in service in a large restaurant where I was given the chance to go and take a course in Hotel and Catering. Then I met Bob, who became my husband. We had our first son in Singapore where

we spent over three happy years and also in Johore Bahru, Malaysia. We had our daughter back in the UK in Nottingham, followed by our second son.

Why Kings Norton?

We came to Kings Norton just over twenty five years ago with my husband's work at National Grid. St Nicolas became our church. It is where our daughter was married twenty years ago and it is where my late husband's memorial service was held after his burial at sea. My daughter-in -law was also Confirmed at St Nicolas.

I am thrilled to be joining the Kings Norton team, to serve as Team Vicar here. I hope that before long I will have had the chance to meet as many as possible of you face to face, but until then, it seemed a good idea to write a few words to give you a bit of an idea of who I am. My name is John. I am married to Priscilla, who is also ordained, and we have three children, Debbie (18), David (16) and Nathan (11). For the last few years, I have been serving as a non-stipendiary minister, whilst looking after the family and working towards a doctorate (completed at last!) in biblical studies. I also enjoy spending time cooking, walking on the Clent Hills, listening to music, and following the fortunes, and frequent misfortunes, of Newcastle United.

We have been living in Birmingham for about four and a half years now, since Priscilla's appointment as Priest-in-Charge of St Faith and St Laurence, Harborne. As she will be continuing in that post, I will be commuting into Kings Norton from Harborne each day – a way of working that's still quite unusual amongst the clergy, even if completely normal for everybody else! After being curates for a while on an estate on the northern edge of Plymouth (wonderfully located for hikes on Dartmoor), I joined the North Sutton Team Ministry, also in Plymouth, as Team Vicar. One of the many things I learned from my time there was how much I enjoyed working alongside other clergy and lay people, rather than in the traditional pattern of "one Vicar for one church". That's one of the reasons I'm so pleased to be joining Rob, Jayne, Rebecca, Donald, Fay, Ruth and Jess in the ministry team here in Kings Norton and Druids Heath, and especially at what looks set to be a very exciting time in our journey together as a parish.

A major part of my role as Team Vicar will be to help all of us, young and not-so -young, to take opportunities to grow in our faith, in our understanding and in our service of God. I am convinced that all God's people are called to serve God's kingdom in many different ways and with many different gifts. I look forward to playing a part in building upon the good things that are already happening here so that, more and more, we may all be equipped and encouraged to share in God's work in God's world. Say One for Me

Isaiah 12.2-5

"Surely God is my salvation; I will trust, and will not be afraid, for the LORD GOD is my strength and my might; he has become my salvation. With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. And you will say on that day: Give thanks to the LORD, call on his name; make known his deeds among the nations; proclaim that his name is exalted. Sing praises to the LORD, for he has done gloriously; let this be known in all the earth." (NRSV Version)

At the turn of the year, I have been thinking about some verses at the beginning of Isaiah Chapter 12 that talk about the promise of salvation. After the excitement of Christmas, we may feel tired and run down. Our mood can also be affected by the dark winter months. The prophet's faith affirms that fear, weakness and sadness, that can so easily dominate, are overcome by the greater reality of God's gift of salvation experienced in trust, strength and joy.

When I first came to Birmingham, I smashed a clay jar in the Cathedral to remind us that God uses the fragility of our humanity to reveal his glory. At the heart of our salvation is a crucified Lord Jesus, raised from the dead. Our vulnerability is to live in the faith that 'there is salvation in no one else' (Acts 4:12).

This is particularly true when we are talking about the power of prayer. Last year, my colleague, the Bishop of Worcester, began an initiative called 'Say One For Me.' On Ash Wednesday he visited a job centre in Redditch and asked the people there if he could pray for them. The vast majority agreed and filled in a prayer card – and that night in the cathedral he prayed for the people he had met. the waiting room when she had her injection, this time she was as quiet as a mouse when she had her booster jab. After taking her home, I went back to the Parish Office to get on with some work and it snowed so I ended up being stuck there for longer than expected. When I eventually got home, I had lots to catch up on including some very long and difficult phone calls.

Thursday 7th

I managed to get into Hawkesley Church Primary School despite the snow. It was good to see parents and children again after the Christmas break and to see the staff back in action. All felt very positive and in good heart. Unfortunately through the day the weather got worse and so some of the things taking place at church were cancelled. I was due to give a talk to the 'Women's Fellowship' in the evening but that got cancelled too. I used the time to do some work on the computer.

Wednesday 13th

Woke up to another heavy fall of snow. I took Zooka out for her early morning walk. She loves the snow and becomes like a mini snow plough as she sticks her head into it. When she comes up for air she has usually has a blob of snow on the end of her nose which stays there until it melts and then she puts her nose back into the snow again. It all makes for a fun walk and some strange looks from those who pass us by!

I spent a lot of time on the phone talking to people and checking folk were ok, especially those stuck at home and unable to get out because of the snow. I rang the Queen Elizabeth Hospital to see how one of our church members was doing. She is very ill indeed and before she went into hospital I used to visit her at home. At the moment she is on an isolation ward and not allowed any visitors. I'll be glad when I can go and see her again.

Fri January Ist

Having spent New Year's Eve with friends and watched the fireworks display over Birmingham, I spent New Year's Day at home doing very mundane jobs like cleaning. I also managed to iron all my clergy shirts and, of course, catch up on emails.

Saturday 2nd

As I usually do on a Saturday morning, I went down to 'Knit, Natter and Coffee,' held at St. Nicolas Church. Unfortunately when I got there, it had been cancelled, but then I bumped into a rather lovely man who attends St. Nicolas Church and he took me under his wing and walked me back to his house for a coffee and bun. We were joined by his daughter and so I ended up having a good catch up on all their news and a good cup of coffee into the bargain! I spent the afternoon pondering and writing up my sermon for Sunday morning.

Monday 4th

Today was the day when Zooka (as in the dog!) had her vaccination booster, so off we went early in the morning to the vet. She is very good at the vet's, but tends to get nervous and so shakes from the tip of her nose to the end of her tail. Unlike last year when she screamed the place down and upset all the other dogs and cats in I hope to develop this movement of prayer in Birmingham this year and make myself available to gather prayers from people who are feeling weak and in need. Prayer is something all Christians can offer which is widely welcomed. Recent statistics showed around 65% of people in England pray.



Jesus is our light in the world today and the things that he said and did is the light that makes us see more clearly, that guides us and comforts us.

The Hungersite

"Feed the starving at no cost to you!" Submitted by Stephen Plant.

Go to www.thehungersite.com and, amid a pile of banners, you'll see an orange button in the middle of the site's front page. The emblazoned message is 'Click here to give - it's free!' Do so and a cup of a staple foodstuff is bought for someone somewhere who is hungry. The logic behind this site is brilliant. It's a winwin-win situation for the starving, the internet user and the sponsors: in practical terms they receive cost effective, feel good public relations, especially powerful in helping promote ethical brands. The food is distributed by Mercy Corps, a large US charity which provides aid in 74 countries including Ethiopia, Guatemala, Somalia and Kosovo; and Feeding America (previously known as America's Second Harvest), which helps support the homeless, the elderly, disaster victims and many more groups in the US.

How much food is given? In the year 2000 The Hunger Site paid for over 9,500 tons of food to be distributed, enough to feed nearly 400,000 people daily. Sadly, management issues and a drop in advertising rates meant the amount donated plummeted. However, the recovery has been ongoing and by the end of 2008, 3,800 tons of food were delivered; enough for over 160,000

people and over 10 million more cups than in 2007.

Taking time to click really helps, especially if you do it daily. The Hunger Site offers an e-mail daily prompt reminder service (signing up to it also gives an additional two cups of food). The site then places a cookie on your computer (this means it then knows who you are whenever you go to the site), so you can see how many times you've managed to click in the current year. Though if you don't want this, it can be disabled.

Instead of clicking, play a game

There's also a great website that raises funds for charity by getting its sponsors to make a rice donation for every user it gets; but you've got to play a game to earn it. Simply click on FreeRice.com and a word will be displayed with four possible definitions. All you need to do is guess the correct definition and for every word you get right, 10 grains of rice will be donated to the World Food Programme.

This site is really quite wonderful as you can easily clock up a few thousand grains of rice in 20 minutes enough to feed a person for several days - depending on how good you are (and how addictive you find it) plus there's no limit to how much rice you can tot up per day.

(serves 8 people)



Ingredients

- I onion
- 4 carrots
- 4 medium sized potatoes
- I green cabbage
- I can of tinned tomatoes
- 2 fresh tomatoes
- 4 green peppers
- 2 teaspoons of salt
- I teaspoon of ground ginger
- 3 cups of water
- 4 tablespoons of vegetable oil

Method



I. In a four quart saucepan, sauté the chopped onion in the oil until soft but not brown.


2. Add the carrots, peeled and cut into one inch slices; the green peppers, cleaned and cut into quarters; three cups of water; the tinned tomatoes; two teaspoons of salt and half a teaspoon of ground ginger.

- 3. Cover with a lid and cook for 10 minutes.
- 4. Add the potatoes, cut into thick slices.
- 5. Plunge the fresh tomatoes in boiling water, remove skins and cut
- in eight wedges each. Add to the mixture.
- 6. Cover and cook for 10 minutes.
- 7. Cut the cabbage into one inch wide wedges and add to the mixture.
- 8. Cook until the vegetables are tender.
- 9. Season to taste and serve.



Without the road closure they would, at the very best, have to move the market, and at the worst would have to close.

They appealed for people to email their local Councillors and tell them that they support the Market and want to keep it open.

Within hours, Duncan Ross was able to send this email...

"We've just heard that our road closures have been approved and that our market is therefore safe! There has been a "communication problem" within the Highways Department - as a result we were told something that was, well, wrong. Unfortunately, we had to take action, as if it had been true we would have been forced to close. Many thanks to all of you who have written, emailed, blogged or even twitted on this. It is very much appreciated. I hope we'll see you all at the market on Saturday. Come along and say hello.
