

The Crucifixion Drawing

Mike Westley, the artist, has offered his work to St Nicolas as a home for now. It will stay in the North Aisle. Many have already found it a deep source for prayer, reflection and faith. Please use it – and do ask if you would like to explore its meaning further.

The Tomb in the North Aisle

Christ did not own his tomb: it was given - by Joseph of Arimathea (John 19 vv 38-42). Made of rock – hewn by human hands - it gave safe and dignified burial according to Jewish custom.

Our tomb takes an extra view. It represents Golgotha – "The Place of the Skull" - the place of killing outside of the safety of the City Walls – no man's land – the place

where criminals were crucified. left to die and their bodies left without care or sanctified burial.

It would have been a place where the homeless may have gathered sifting through the rubbish and waste to

create shelters – as millions do in shanty towns today.

Our tomb is a representation of a shanty dwelling, as well as a tomb. The ledges for the bodies could represent seats; but they can also end up as tombs for those who:

- have no food or clean water:
- suffer the diseases of poverty and malnutrition without care:
- are trafficked for others' greed;
- are made refugee or homeless through war or in natural or economic disaster.

The space inside is nearly large enough to stand up in; it is nearly a house, but not really. It is a ragged attempt of a dwelling, built out of other people's cast-offs

but it is someone's home.

It is their space - a few square feet that is their own, a shelter. A domestic space. A meeting place. A place of life.

Christ is here in this desolation, invit-

ing our trust and commitment to his Easter promise that, in him. Kingdom his of peace and justice will come here and in all creation. For Christ's borrowed tomb is a meeting place too - of earth's raw truth and

heaven's hope.


A prayer

Keeping hope alive: 'education for life'

Eighteen year old Nadia Kabula's story is not an extraordinary one. For many people in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), life is a struggle. Following ten years of conflict, malnourishment and preventable diseases still claim thousands of lives each week. Christian Aid partner organisations are helping to rebuild lives and livelihoods in some of the DRC's most vulnerable communities.

After the greatest challenge of Nadia's life, Christian Aid partner Humanité Nouvelle was there to help her focus on the future and the hope of a better life.

Nadia's father died suddenly two and a half years ago. Her grieving mother, Brigitte, struggled to provide for her six children. Even though Brigitte works gruelling 48-hour shifts, some weeks her transport costs total almost as much as her weekly salary.

Nadia was profoundly affected by the death of her father, whom she adored. And his death had immediate practical implications. There was no money to pay for her schooling, so she had to drop out and care for her younger siblings while their mother worked.

Families like Nadia's often hear about Humanité Nouvelle's tailoring course through their local church. The course helps poor girls to develop skills to support themselves and their families. Nadia explains why girls in similar situations turn to sex work: 'They need to pursue their education and, with a lack of means, get desperate.'

It would have been easy for Nadia to despair. But instead, Humanité Nouvelle 'have given me education for life', she says. She completed the course and now helps to teach the new intake of girls.

Nadia still takes care of her siblings, as well as being a mentor at Humanité Nouvelle. Her mother describes her as 'a blessing... [without her] things would be very hard'. And it's not just her family who speak so positively of her – her pastor also talks about the inspiring influence of her gospel singing.

Nadia is confident that she can earn a good living from sewing and she is clear about her priorities: 'If God helps me... I will do all I can to take care of my siblings and my mother.'

As collectors, we can be inspired by Nadia. Even in difficult circumstances, she is planting seeds of hope around her.

And Nadia's mother has a message for us: 'You volunteers should not be discouraged when you're turned away from houses. You should carry on because without that money it would be very difficult for... children from destitute backgrounds to get training, get a job and secure their future.'

Your time and money are more valuable than you know. You could give a chance of a brighter future to another young person like Nadia and support them to bring hope to the people around them.

The ripple effect of collecting at Christian Aid Week is immense. By taking part, you are working alongside people like Nadia to help change the world. In the DRC:

- £5 could buy six yards of material, from which a threepiece woman's outfit can be made:
- £10 could provide a girl with enough material to complete a 12 month tailoring course;
- £40 could pay the monthly salary of a tailoring instructor.

HISTORY OF HYMNS

scension Day falls on May 21st this year. It seems to get less attention than the other Feast which is part of Eastertide, Pentecost (Whitsun), mainly because it falls on a Thursday (40 days after Easter Day) and not on a Sunday. Some denominations have now transferred it to the following Sunday, because of this.

One of the most regularly sung, traditional hymns for Ascensiontide is "Hail the day that sees Him rise" by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). Most hymn books now use the version adapted by Thomas Cotterill in 1820 rather than the original 10 verse Wesley one.

It is full of teaching of the significance of the Ascension: Christ's life and death on earth; his heavenly reign and his prayer life in both earth and heaven. He doesn't forget us, and our need of heaven at our own death, just because he is there as King. Re-read Luke 24 vv 36-53 again, to remind yourself of the story.

It is often sung to the Welsh melody "Llanfair", by Robert Williams (1781-1821), with the festive Alleluias after each line.

Hail the day that sees Him rise *Alleluia*To his throne above the skies; *Alleluia*Christ, the Lamb for sinners given *Alleluia*Enters now in highest heaven! *Alleluia*

There for him high triumph waits; *Alleluia* Lift your heads, eternal gates! *Alleluia* He hath conquered death and sin; *Alleluia* Take the King of Glory in! *Alleluia*

Lo, the heaven its Lord receives, *Alleluia* Yet he loves the earth he leaves; *Alleluia* Though returning to his throne, *Alleluia* Calls the human race his own. *Alleluia*

See, he lifts his hands above; *Alleluia* See, he shows the prints of love; *Alleluia* Hark, his gracious lips bestow *Alleluia* Blessings on his Church below. *Alleluia*

Still for us he intercedes, *Alleluia*His prevailing death he pleads; *Alleluia*Near himself prepares our place, *Alleluia*He the first fruits of our race. *Alleluia*

Lord, though parted from our sight, *Alleluia* Far above the starry height, *Alleluia* Grant our hearts may thither fly, *Alleluia* Seeking thee above the skies. *Alleluia*

HENRY SANDON LUNCH REVIEW

On Sunday 8th March 2009, we were privileged to have Henry Sandon and his wife, Barbara, at our Fund Raising Lunch, which he had volunteered to do after visiting St Nicolas' Place and enjoying a snack lunch at The Saracen's Head. He remembered the wedding of his cousin, Anne Mellish to Phil Haycock in 1955 and that both of them had belonged to the King's Norton Youth Fellowship. (Sadly Anne died in 1996.)

The Lunch had cost £25.00 per person and a Raffle was held to help raise more money for The Restoration Fund. Two good prizes were donated by Jane of HAIR on the Green and the majority of the prizes were donated by my partner, Phil Haycock, and my friends, Elizabeth Chattaway and Rosemary Foulkes, for which I am indebted.

Rosemary organised the sale of the Raffle tickets and she was ably assisted in this job by Margaret Hopley, Daphne Baker and Sabine Hofmann. The Raffle was run as a tombolacum-raffle, meaning you did not choose your prize, but picked the number of it from another bag.

Henry sat for nearly an hour before lunch, and again until almost 5pm after his talk, to value items brought in by a number of people. Some of them, including Sabine, were thrilled at their valuations, but my cousin John, was very disappointed to hear that the Worcester Ladies he bought for over £90.00 were now only valued at £40 -£45 in today's market. Sad news indeed.

The double act of Henry and Barbara had the audience in stitches and one or two said they had not laughed so much for years. Henry's memory is often faulty these days and Barbara chipped in to correct him frequently. "Ooh, I have trouble with her sometimes" he quipped, and yet often he would look at her and say

"Who was that?" and "What happened then?"

Their repartee was quick witted and friendly and the audience loved it.

Henry told us how the Queen had tears of emotion running down her cheeks when he had presented her, for her 80th birthday, a porcelain model of her favourite pony. It had taken 'Bronte Porcelain' two years to make to exact proportions and colouring and was encased in a mahogany box. When he went later on to collect his MBE, Queen Elizabeth whispered to Henry that she kept the pony in her private quarters.

After the MBE Ceremony, Henry found his old car had died on him in the car park at Buckingham Palace. When he rang the AA to come and assist him and was asked his position, they laughed and said "Pull the other leg. Where are you really?" "Buckingham Palace. I really am here!"


Henry had intended to bring us a Raffle Prize from Bronte, but the current recession has pushed Bronte into liquidation and he was not allowed to touch any of the stocks.

ell, you have heard me tell many times about our recycling project and I think I told you that we had managed to gain some funding to buy the storage shed to hold the household items we are hoping to collect. Well, the shed has arrived! Now we just need to find some people who have the skills to use the provided foundation kit and the time to help put it all together. Please contact me if you can or if you know of anybody who may be able to help us.

The Focus Groups I told you about last time have happened and it has been wonderful to listen to people talking about the things they would like to see in their community. There were two groups that were a little special: the first were the young people at a vouth club that is held at Bells Farm Community Centre. They told me that they would like houses just the same as the ones they had but not together (ie. detached), although one of the younger children said they would quite like to live in a castle! They also said that they wished there was not so much mess and graffiti around the estate and thirteen of the twenty said they would help if we organised a clean-up. The second were the ladies who meet at Dell Meadow and are taking a course in English as a second language. They represent a number of different countries: Iran, Somalia and Pakistan, to name just a few. They were very willing to talk, even though some of them still struggle a little with

English, but they were very positive about living in Druids Heath and very grateful for all the help that they had received. It was wonderful talking with them.

What we discovered through doing these groups is the real views of the people who live in the neighbourhood and now it is up to me to write a report that can be shared with others and ensure those voices are heard and that what they said has an effect upon their futures.

Going on from the Prayer Meetings we have been holding at Dell Meadow, we recently held a Prayer Day. Phill from Dickens Heath and I planned it with lots of help from the Prayer and World Needs Group and it was a superb day. James began with an Ignation Meditation. Deb moved us on to some beading where we thought about issues from the estate as we chose our beads. After lunch we listened to some wonderful music with Phill and let it lead our thoughts and prayers for the area. Finally, I led everyone in a Lectio Devina, using Scripture to meditate and relating it to the present. With thanks to those who attended and all those who made it possible.





For it to progress as it is at the moment. When you see the contrast of the various services, it is encouraging seeing people being in church and attracting young people.







Pentecost - 31st May 2009

Pentecost is one of the Christian church's more exuberant and joyful celebrations. Considered to be the Church's birthday, Pentecost takes place 50 days after Easter Sunday.

Story of Pentecost

Believed to be the oldest feast in the Church, the story of Pentecost dates back to the first century. The feast originated from the Jewish Feast of Weeks, which occurs 50 days after the Passover (Deuteronomy 16:10). According to Jewish tradition, the Ten Commandments were given to Moses 50 days after the first Passover, which freed the Hebrews from their bondage in Egypt. As the Hebrews settled into Canaan, the feast became a time to honour the Lord for blessing the fruits of their labours. At the time of Jesus, the festival focused on rabbinical law and traditions.

Meaning of Pentecost

According to Scriptures in the Book of Acts, the Church came into being on the Day of Pentecost. As 120 worshippers, including the Disciples, were fasting and praying in an upper room in Jerusalem, the Holy Spirit descended upon them in a violent, rushing wind that was heard throughout the city. Small flames of fire rested upon their heads, and they began to speak in other languages. As crowds came to investigate the commotion, the Apostle Peter spoke to them about Jesus and exhorted them to repent. From the crowd of Jews and

converts, 3000 realised the truth of his

words and became followers of Jesus.

Pentecost Traditions

There are many Pentecost traditions. In some churches, baptisms are performed throughout the day. Pentecost is also known as Whitsunday, because of the white garments worn by those who are baptised. In most Pentecost services, priests or church officials wear red vestments. Sanctuaries are decorated with banners depicting flames, wind and doves. Churches in Italy disperse rose petals from the ceiling to symbolise the tongues of fire described in the book of Acts. French churches blow trumpets throughout the service to suggest the Holy Spirit coming with a violent, rushing wind. Both Catholic and Protestant services have scripture readings from the books of Isaiah, Ezekiel, Joel or Acts.

The purest meaning of Pentecost is that of a time of renewal for Christian believers. Through studying the story of Pentecost, many seek and pray for spiritual gifts for the church during this time of holy celebration. There is a renewed focus on evangelism, empowerment from the Holy Spirit, deeper intimacy with God and fellowship. For Christians, the celebration of Pentecost imparts faith, hope, a sharing of community, and an awareness of a purpose much greater than themselves.

God at Work

A leading merchant banker, who is a churchwarden of one of the largest Anglican churches in London, has been in Birmingham to launch a course helping Christians to live out their faith in the workplace.

Ken Costa was introduced by the Bishop of Birmingham, the Rt Revd David Urguhart, The Bishop and Mr. Costa have been friends for more than 30 years. They met in the 1970s when both were working in London. Bishop David spoke about his time working for BP and the daily decisions he faced in the world of business, which he would now label 'ethical' decisions. He said Christians in the workplace were on the frontline and said the God at Work course showed great realism as it tackled issues such as stress, failure and disappointment, ambition and life choices.

During the launch of the God at Work course, Chairman of Lazards Bank, Ken Costa, outlined his perspective on the current financial turmoil in a talk called "Responding to the Vision in the Global Credit Crisis".

Mr Costa told the 130 business people gathered at Birmingham Cathedral that what we were seeing was a financial tsunami, a massive dislocation which was only seen once in every 100 to 150 years.

He said there was an immediate need

to fix the banking system and that the question that everyone should be asking was not, 'How long will this last?' but 'What will emerge from the crisis?'

"Trust has been fractured", he said. "Money is not gold. Money is a promise. Trust is required for our economic system to work and this has been fractured. A new trust economy will have to emerge."

"This is not just a financial tsunami, although its roots are in the financial realm, it is a spiritual and moral tsunami. Morality was contracted out and ethical commentators marginalised."

"The spiritual dimensions of fuelling a binge of artificially stimulated desires and the moral dimensions of making investment decisions without understanding what the instruments are and how they would affect people's lives can't just be put into a little box marked 'Financial'. It affects every aspect of our lives. And who is responsible for this irrational exuberance?

Was it:

- * the governments who were asleep? * the regulators who didn't spend their time regulating the capital and the liquidity of the financial institutions? * the boards of the financial institutions or their shareholders?"
- "I don't know it's too close to give a precise answer. But could it be you and me who spent more on our credit cards than we knew was wise to do? We did not have the wisdom to show restraint. We bought houses that were

just a little more expensive than we could afford."

"I don't think we escape. The uncontrolled fear, the deception, the ignorance of risk and the lack of knowledge about the value of investments became a way of living and the market economy became a god."

"The resulting global structures were being formed without any reference to God. We became proud. We thought we were in a steady state of governance and globally we would be intact. How shallow that is looking now. We became proud, we became powerful. We were told the market could provide happiness."

"One of the great post war lies was that material prosperity could bring happiness. We became very proud of our achievements. Our globalised world became nothing more than the unrestrained access to further consumables. One word in my mind characterises this whole era: more."

"Then this amazing, complex edifice just toppled over. People sometimes ask me if this is the judgement of God. I don't know. But we are living with the consequences of our actions lived without reference to God who created the way of life for us."

"When trust is broken at that exaggerated level, it is no different from trust being broken in your life and my life. We have to mend it painfully and step by step. There's no global solution to trust and let me say this: trust is profoundly not an accounting mech-

anism. It is not a concept of finance and economics. It is profoundly a spiritual and Biblical notion."

"This is why we need to recognise that repentance is needed. What is repentance? Recognising what I've done wrong, determining not to do it again and turning my back on it."

"And then once the trust is restored we would expect to see a reshaping of the wreckage. We will need new global institutions that:

- · reflect our values;
- · reflect the moral and spiritual aspects, as well as the financial aspects, of what we have seen."

"The search for spiritual and moral values, the search for the values that underlie the nature of our social and economic lives, has never been more acute. This long, humanist winter is ending. It was unable to provide us the answer – happiness, security, purpose, insulation against shock. What will come in its place? We must agitate for new values. We must buy into something bigger than ourselves, which is the Body of Christ working and agitating for change."

Mr Costa reminded the congregation that workplaces were places into which Christians were called because work is valuable in the sight of God. By making ethical and honest decisions, people could extend the kingdom of God's influence bit by bit.

He said that although it felt difficult to make a difference, and it is on your own, 12 people filled with the Holy Spirit of God turned the world upside down.
